POSTOFFICE ROBBED.

Burglars Dynamite Safe in Office at
South San Francisco.
San Francisco, July 17.—Eighteen
hundred dollars worth of loot was
taken by burglars from the South
San Francisco Postoffice last night.
Cracking the safe with dynamite,
they rifled it of all the valuables it
contained and made their escape.
Detectives and postal inspectors are
working hard to run them to earth.
After securing an entrance into
the postoffice the burglars opened the
safe with a charge of dynamite which
shattered the mechanism of the
heavy door and smashed the drawers
and compartments to splinters.
Money and stamps to the value of
\$1,800 were inside the safe and
formed the booty with which the
burglars made off. They escaped as
they entered, without having been
seen, and left behind nothing which
would serve as a clue to their iden-
tity.

THREE KILLED BY BOMB

GENERAL ALIKHANOFF, MADAM
GLEDOFF AND COACHMAN
BLOWN TO PIECES.

Alexandropol, Russia, July 17.—
General Alikhanoff, former Governor
General of Tiflis; Madam Gledoff,
and the coachman who was driving
their carriage were blown to pieces
by bombs thrown at their convey-
ance at 2:30 o'clock yesterday.

A son of General Alikhanoff and a
daughter of General Gledoff sus-
tained serious injuries.

The party were returning to the
residence of General Alikhanoff from
his club. The bombs were hurled in
Beboutoff street.

General Alikhanoff was nicknamed
"the wild beast" by the Caucasian
members of the lower house of Par-
liament, who often referred to his
cruelty in the Kutais district, where
he led a number of punitive expedi-
tions to stamp out disorder. His
rigorous methods to this end brought
down upon him the enmity of the
revolutionists.

Alikhanoff was seriously injured
by a bomb at Borjam May 30 of last
year. This bomb was thrown just as
he was about to take a train for
Tiflis. Its explosion seriously wound-
ed, in addition to the general, a
member of his staff and several Cos-
sacks. The remainder of the Cos-
sacks fired into the crowd, killing
many persons, and then burned to
the ground the buildings in which
the people fled.

Elected to the Senate.
Montgomery, Ala., July 17.—The
two houses of the Legislature today,
in separate session, elected former
Congressman John H. Bankhead to
the United States Senate to succeed
the late Senator Morgan.

INJURED MEN

WELL CARED FOR

INVESTIGATION SHOWS THAT
ACCIDENT ON THE GEORGIA
WAS CAUSED BY SPARK.

While Bag of Powder Was Being
Carried to a Gun It Became Ig-
nited and Explosion Follows.

Boston, July 17.—Of the thirteen
survivors of those injured through
the ignition of a bag of powder in the
after-superimposed turret of the bat-
tleship Georgia while the vessel was
engaged in target practice in Cape
Cod by Monday, three are believed
to have but a small chance of re-
covery. The injured are at the naval
hospital at Chelsea. The three men
whose lives are despaired of are
Edward J. Walsh, seaman, of Lynn,
Mass., whose chest and face are
badly burned; Louis O. Meene, of
Berea, O., ordinary seaman, whose
arms, face and chest were burned,
and James P. Thomas, ordinary
seaman, of Brooklyn, N. Y., whose
face, arms, chest and back were
burned.

The hospital authorities reported
that Walsh and Thomas might live
through the day.

When the Georgia arrived here she
carried the corpses of six of her crew
who had died from burns upon the
way from the target grounds to the
hospital, and last night two more
succumbed to their injuries. One of
those who died last night was Lieu-
tenant Goodrich, son of Rear Ad-
miral Caspar E. Goodrich, com-
mandant of the New York navy yard.

Admiral Goodrich arrived at the
hospital with his wife last night
just before his son died, after a hur-
ried trip from Brooklyn.

The cause of the accident was the
falling of a spark which was prob-
ably blown from one of the Georgia's
smokestacks on a bag of powder
which a loader was carrying to a
gun. The powder burst into flames
and enveloped the twenty-one men
who were penned in the steel cage.
The battleship suffered comparatively
little damage from the explosion and
resumed target practice under orders
of the Navy Department.

Yamamoto Sends Flowers to Dead.

Boston, Mass., July 17.—Two great
boxes, one addressed to Midshipman
Cruse and the other to "the sailors
of the Georgia," were received at the
naval hospital today. They con-
tained flowers and inside of each
box was the card of Admiral Yama-
moto, the Japanese naval officer,
who visited Boston yesterday.

High Water Cause of Collision.

Kansas City, Mo., July 17.—Chi-
cago Great Western train No. 4 col-
lided with Chicago, Burlington &
Quincy passenger train No. 23 at
Bethel, Kas., ten miles north of here
last night, resulting in the injury of
three persons. Because of the high
water on the Missouri side of the
Missouri river, Burlington trains
bound for Omaha and Sioux City are
using the Chicago Great Western
tracks on the Kansas side of the
river. The Burlington train left here
ahead of the Chicago Great Western
train, but was delayed at Bethel be-
cause of an accident to its engine.

Owing to the confusion of orders
the Chicago Great Western train ap-
proached Bethel at high speed and
crashed into the rear end of the
other train. The last sleeper of the
Burlington train was derailed and all
of its occupants shaken up, one pas-
senger being seriously injured. Two
trainmen were also slightly injured.

Train Robbers Kill One Man.

Cherryvale, Kas., July 17.—Two
robbers held up a St. Louis & San
Francisco freight train five miles east
of Cherryvale early today, shot and
killed O. J. Brown and seriously
wounded Otis Taylor, harvest hands.
The victims were beating their way
home to Western Kansas after hav-
ing worked in the wheat fields in the
southern part of the State. They re-
sisted the efforts of the men to rob
them. Brown was shot and died al-
most instantly. Taylor was wound-
ed twice seriously, but may recover.
The robbers escaped and a posse has
started in pursuit.

Salt Lake Feels an Earthquake.

Salt Lake, Utah, July 17.—Dis-
tinct earthquake shocks, lasting for
about one minute, was recorded yes-
terday on the seismograph recently
installed at the University of Utah.
Disturbance was noted at 11:59 a. m.
Movement from a little north of west
toward east.

LAWYER WALKS IN HIS SLEEP.

Dreams Redskins Pursue Him and
Escapes by Way of Fire-Escape.

San Francisco, July 17.—Pursued
by Indians in his dreams, Francis R.
Bosselly, a well known attorney oc-
cupying apartments at the Hotel Au-
dubon, crept cautiously from his bed
to a bedroom window shortly after
3 o'clock this morning. From the
window he swung out on the fire-
escape, made his way down the five
stories to the bottom of the fire-
escape ladder, and then jumped
twelve feet to the hard cement pave-
ment below.

Even this plunge did not awaken
the sleeping attorney, nor was he in-
jured by the fall. He was clad only
in his pajamas and he believed the
Indians were still after him. He
could see shadows of the swarthy
warriors all about him, and he fled
hurriedly up Ellis street. At Ellis
and Van Ness he encountered Police-
man Thomas Kelly, who believed he
was dealing with a maniac or a
drunk. The officer questioned Bos-
selly but could only glean from his
incoherent talk that he was pursued
by Indians, and that if he did not
get away from them he would surely
be scalped.

The dazed condition of the attor-
ney startled the policeman, who de-
termined to investigate the case be-
fore sending the man to a hospital
or jail. He took Bosselly to the of-
fices of a carriage company and there
found somebody who knew him. It
was here that Bosselly awakened
from his sleep for the first time. He
started to explain that he had been
dreaming of Indians, but before he
could finish his explanation or give
any information that would throw
light on how he happened to be
where the officer found him, he
lapsed into unconsciousness.

Bosselly was taken at once to his
apartments and is now there in the
care of a physician.

UNFAVORABLE REPORT

DR. VOORSANGER SAYS COLON-
IZATION OF JEWS IN HOLY
LAND IMPRACTICABLE.

New York, July 17.—The Rev. Dr.
Jacob Voorsanger, pastor of Temple
Emanuel of San Francisco, declared
last night at the Hotel Astor that the
proposition to take the Jews of the
United States to Palestine, to inaugu-
rate there a new country for the
Jews, is fallacious and should not be
given serious consideration. Dr.
Voorsanger has just returned from a
trip in the Holy Land, made for the
special purpose of studying condi-
tions there.

"I am convinced," said he, "that
neither as a political nor economical
measure is it advisable. The country
is beautiful, but it is fertile only in
spots. The mountains are sterile and
only the valleys are fertile, and these
are now occupied by Arabs, groaning
under the taxation of the Govern-
ment. They have been there 1,200
years and will not easily be removed.

"In the first place the whole coun-
try must be purchased, and where is
the money to come from? Baron
Rothschild has spent 78,000,000 of
francs, more than \$15,000,000, on
the twenty-odd colonies already es-
tablished, and these do not constitute
one-fortieth of the whole area.

"Some features of Zionism are very
excellent, but as far as political
Zionism is concerned, I am opposed
to it and always will be. The prob-
lem of the Jew is a part of the prob-
lem of the country and it will come
out."

"The political sovereignty of the
Jew is a dead issue. My Americanism
has no mental reservations. My flag
is the flag of my country, and I want
no other. The duty of the Jews in
this country is to live and work for
the country of their birth or per-
haps adoption, and to see that no
shadow rests upon this their coun-
try."

Uncle Kills Nephew in Pistol Duel.

Petersburg, Va., July 17.—In a
pistol duel late last night John
Wheelhouse was shot and instantly
killed and his nephew, Richard
Wheelhouse, perhaps fatally wound-
ed. The fight between the uncle and
nephew was the culmination of a
family feud of long standing.
