He thinks that he has the latest notable strike in that district, for he has four feet of azurite ore, at a depth of 45 feet and he has the vein opened up for a distance of 500 feet and the vein is over five feet wide, on an average. He hasn't had any assays made, as yet, but his tests show over six per cent copper and quite high in gold. He expects Mr. Cornell to call upon him, the next time he comes to that camp and then he can see things for himself and be convinced that he has one of the finest properties to be found anywhere.

The owners of the "Blackhawk" mine in the Galice district are feeling pretty good over the way things are turning out in respect to their rich properties. They have three fine claims and one of the owners W. L. Montgomery, who has just been in the city on a business trip, informs the Courier that the assays made give a showing of six per cent of fine copper. They have quite a ledge of it and propose running a tunnel and cross cut the vein. They have an offer to bond the property in the sum of \$25,000, but are really not so very anxious to let it go, as it has every appearance of being a very good thing.

C. L. Barlow, the Galice merchant was at the county seat a few days ago and he brings some good news regarding that mining district. He tells of the "Alameda" shipping large quantities of ore to the Tacoma smelter, while the "Gold Finch," people are putting on a larger force of men, getting ready for the winter's run. R. E. Doane, manager of the "Gold Finch" made a business trip to that promising property the past week. L. E. Cronch, attorney for the Alameda Consolidated Mines Co., has been up from Portland, on important business connected with the mines. F. J. Barlow has returned to his home at Bellingham, Wash., after having made his sons at Galice a visit of several weeks. S. A. Sharkey, a prominent mining promoter of Portland has been "rounding up" the mines in this camp and is greatly pleased with what he has found.

J. W. McIntyre, the transportation man thinks that he has a mighty good thing in the "Missouri Bar," mine, located out on Whiskey Creek. He built a big ditch two years ago, but was unable to operate the same last season, owing to a press of business matters elsewhere. This winter he will be in readiness to carry on the work nicely, having just placed the pipe and joint and he anticipates a good run.

Edward Friday has given John F. Saunders an agreement to sell his undivided interest in the following claims, on or before March 9, 1908: "Star," "Blue Earth," "45," "Golden Crown," "Chief," "Golden Fleeces," "Ophir," "Homestake," "Elkhorn," "Hadley," "Emeralds," and "Ready Cash."

County Commissioner J. T. Logan has time to operate a very promising placer property, out on his Waldo place and in order to care for the men who will work there this winter, he is just now busily engaged building a comfortable two story house where they will have quarters for the coming season.

MINING MEN DECLARE WE'RE IN THE BELT

They have been studying the format ones and the general lay of the land and they are willing to risk their reputation as successful mining men on making such assertions.

This will be a great thing for the men who are delving into the bowels of the earth for the precious metals, for it will afford them a climate that has no superior and very few equals. Mr. Williamson took occasion to emphasize this fact and stated that no ordinary man could long survive the very trying climate which they have in Goldfield. The mortality there is something awful to contemplate and were it not for the wonderfully rich ore that is to be had in such great abundance people would never remain to inhabit that section. As it is he says it is beyond all doubt the richest camp in all the world.

The opinion of Mr. Williamson is being coincided in by numerous mining experts who come this way making careful observations of the properties which are here to be found. Of course all this sounds good for the minerals of the Rogue River Valley are undoubtedly one of its greatest and best assets.
