Turkeys and chickens were quite plentiful this Thanksgiving season and the prices were more reasonable than at former seasons. Turkeys, undressed brought 14 cents per pound, or 18 cents dressed.

Notice to Fruit Growers.

Fruitgrowers troubled with anthracnose, San Jose scale, green or wooly aphid or moss upon their trees, should use an application of Lime Sulphur solution of 30 per cent strength, at once. It is claimed by Experiment station men that the Lime Sulphur mixture is equally as good as Bordeaux or anthracnose (dead spot) but should not be used until the leaves begin falling heavily. Fruitgrowers will find it much easier to control pests by spraying this fall and again next spring, than by using only the spring application.

Anthracnose spores are now migrating and are easily killed while it will be practically impossible to get at them later on.
