that no advance in water rates to individuals within this city should be made by the company during the life of the contract. Mr. Hall stated that he "cordially approved the action taken by the council in directing the Light & Water Company to require them to restore the former rate."

"The new rate was advertised October 1, and the only wonder is that action thereon was delayed until November 24. Dr. Smith, in his card, advertises the fact that he owns no stock in the Water Company. Neither do I, and I am quite as anxious as the Doctor to see the old rate restored."

"Now, as regards any appointees, should I happen to be chosen by the people of this city as their Mayor, next Monday: I am free to say most emphatically to you that no one is promised any such place. And, further than that, as to Mr. A. B. Cornell's being appointed Recorder, in the event of my election, will say that he will not be the next Recorder, should I be elected. He has been working zealously for my cause and only because he is a good friend and hopes to see me the choice of the people."

**CANDIDATE LOVE WITHDRAWS**

A petition was circulated by friends of Dr. D. P. Love, requesting that gentleman to run for Councilman in the First Ward, but he has declined the honor, as will be seen by the following:

Dear Sir: In response to your question whether or not you are eligible to the office of Councilman for the City of Grants Pass, Oregon, I have to say, that Art. 2 Sec. 10 of the Charter of Grants Pass among other things provides:

"And no person shall be eligible to the office of Mayor or Councilman who is not in addition to the above qualifications, the owner of real estate within the city." This provision to my mind means exactly what it purports on its face to mean. You not being the "owner of real estate within the city" are certainly not qualified to fill the office should you be elected.

E. M. Albright has returned from his trip to Mexico, where the sun shines all the time, he says.

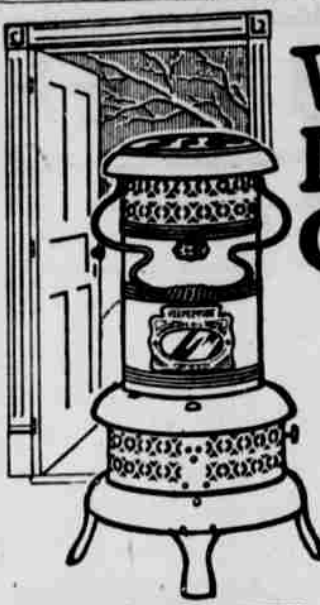
Jas. McGuire and Mike Lange have gone back to their homes on Rancherie Creek, but we did not see any bear pelts going out with them.

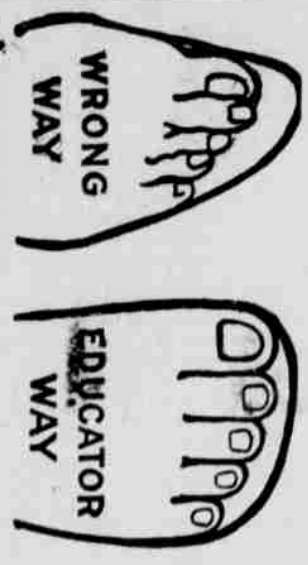
