H. A. Corlies was in from the Placer mines on lower Graves Creek the first of the week.

G. A. Baker, superintendent of the Consolidated mine at Jump-off-Joe was in the city the forepart of the week. The Consolidated shut down Saturday night for repairs.

The Opp mine near Jacksonville, now running 30 stamps is preparing to start up the other 10 stamps within the next few weeks.

The Gilman Bed Rock Mining Co. has just finished a model of its newly patented machine for mining river beds and this model can now be seen at Herzinger & Mitchell's real estate office. It is expected that one of the plants will be in operation on the Rogue river just below Grants Pass by July or August.

M. F. Leith, secretary of the Oak Consolidated Mining and Milling Co., returned to Kansas City Monday. He was accompanied by the general manager of the company's properties, Chas. Birum. They will also visit Chicago and New York City on business.

The Blue Ledge mine on the head of Applegate, which has been employing about 75 men all winter has recently cut the force down to about 12 for the purpose of clearing up and making repairs. The owners of the mine are making preparations to erect a 500-ton smelter this year and after this has been installed it is expected that a force of more than 100 men will be put into the mine.
