GRANGE PICNIC ON FOURTH OF JULY

Will Be Held Under Auspices of Five County Granges at Wilderville.

It has been definitely decided to hold a grange picnic at Wilderville on the Fourth of July. The affair is under the joint auspices of the five Granges in Josephine county, these being the Wilderville, Dimmick, Fruitdale, Deer Creek and Illinois Valley Granges. An executive committee made up of one member from each of these Granges will arrange for the speakers and other features of the program and also have charge of the grounds and sale of the stand privileges and other features connected with the event.

The picnic will be held in a large and beautiful grove on Slate creek near Wilderville postoffice. This grove is one of the best suited for picnic purposes in Rogue River valley for it has a perfect shade, is clean and large enough to accommodate the largest crowd for it is surrounded by forest on three sides. The purest, coldest of drinking water is to be had from a large spring that flows from the base of the hill at the rear of the grounds. Very little work will put the grove in fine condition, for all the picnics held at Wilderville for years past have been held in this grove. The grove is but a short distance from the Grants Pass-Crescent City stage road and is readily accessible by team or automobile, while the adjoining woods will afford ample space for hitching teams.

A program for the day will be arranged that will be of special interest to the farmers and to all others interested in the development of the agricultural wealth of Josephine county. In addition to addresses on topics of public interest there will be musical selections of a high class and a part of the afternoon will be devoted to athletic sports and games. It is expected to have as speakers Austin T. Buxton, of Forest Grove, Mrs. Clara H. Waldo, of Macleay, and Dr. J. W. Kerr, of Corvallis. Mr. Buxton is master of the Oregon State Grange and he is one of the largest and most successful farmers in Washington county. He is a clear, logical speaker and one of the best posted men in Oregon on the questions that interest the farmers. Mrs. Waldo is the lecturer of the Oregon State Grange and as a public speaker she has a national reputation and those who have heard her concede that she is by far the ablest woman speaker on the Pacific Coast. Dr. Kerr is president of the Oregon Agricultural College and that he is fully in touch with the agricultural and industrial interests of Oregon is proven by the fact that under his administration this college has gained in enrollment until it now has 1126 students on the roll, a larger number than has any other agricultural college west of the Rocky mountains. Dr. Kerr is one of the best speakers in Oregon and he is a broad-gauged man whose address will be one of the strong features of the program of the Granger's picnic.

There is every indication that this Grange picnic will have the largest attendance ever had at a picnic or celebration held in Josephine county. There will be no celebration in Grants Pass this Fourth and there will probably be no large celebration at any other place in the county for the Grange celebration will draw so many from each neighborhood that no local celebration will be held. No doubt there will be many Grangers attend from Jackson county for the distinguished speakers will attract them and they will be able to get a one and one-third fare on the railroad. As it will be a delightful outing in the cool shade on the banks of Slate creek a large number of Grants Pass people will be sure to attend. The road to Wilderville is now one of the finest in Rogue River valley and an automobile can easily make the run from Grants Pass to the picnic park in 30 minutes.
