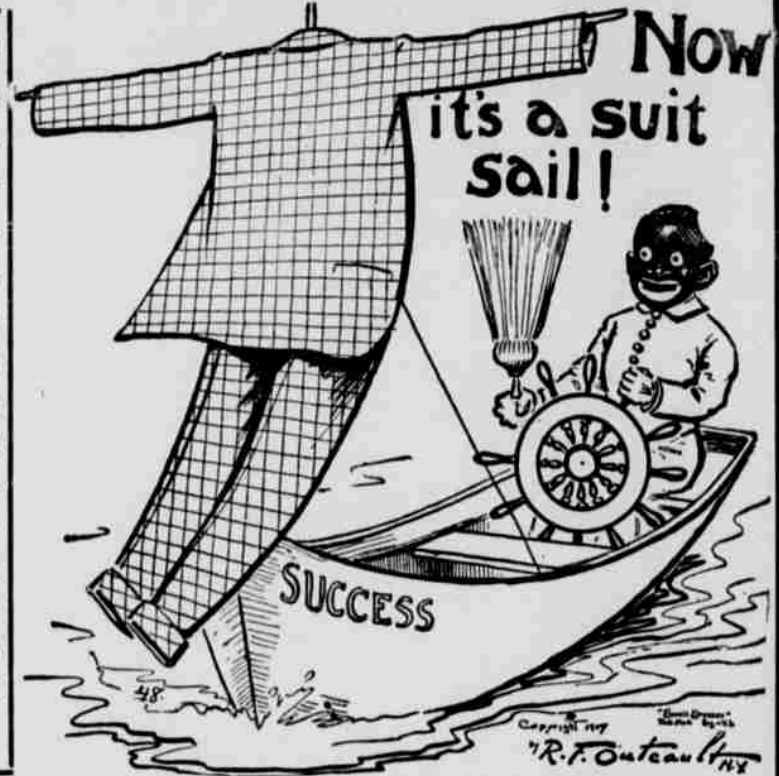

Twelve teams a day hauling out coke and bringing in copper matte are in and out of Grants Pass each day, and the jingle of the bells and the big wagons remind one of the old days. Manager McIntire, located at this end of the line, and who has supervision of the handling and shipping informs the Courier that the company is shipping two cars or an average of about 75 tons of matte from here to Tacoma to be refined each week.
