A union temperance service was held at the opera house last Sunday morning and evening at which \$750 was raised with which to carry on the temperance work. Two-fifths of this amount will be expended for work in the local field, two-fifths for the state at large and one-fifth to the executive office work. Coming so closely after the Fourth the meetings were not so largely attended as was anticipated. The meetings were addressed by Rev. Knodell. It is expected the amount raised Sunday will be doubled, or an aggregate of \$1500 raised within a short time, with which to carry on the temperance work and aid in the prosecution of violations of the prohibition law. There are also \$400 yet uncollected on former pledges. Thus it is evident that the temperance people fully appreciate that the victory at the polls in June was but a beginning of their work.

County Officers Qualify.

Last Monday, as provided by law was the day on which county officers elected at the June election qualified by taking the oath of office. However, but three new officers were inducted—Eclius Pollock, assessor, Fred Mensch, surveyor, and H. S. Woodcock, county commissioner. The remainder of the personnel at the court house remains the same, including Sheriff Russell, County Clerk Cheshire, County Treasurer Taylor, County Supt. Savage and Coroner Stricker. Mr. Mensch was out of the city surveying and hence Surveyor Perkins will hold over till Mr. Mensch qualifies. Assessor Fallin does not vacate his office till January first.
