BEAUTIFUL PAINTING

OF GRANTS PASS

There is an exhibition at Hall's Art Store a large oil painting, by Prof. George O'Brien, of the city of Grants Pass 42x70 inches, which is being greatly admired by those interested in our city and in matters of art. The painting is a fine work of art and represents the city exactly as it appears today from a point on the heights northeast of town at an elevation of about 500 feet above the river two and one-half miles distant from the center of the business section, and looking southwest. The picture is beautiful in its coloring, representing the morning effect of light after a summer shower, a few light clouds still in view as they are passing away toward the east. As a consequence the atmosphere is very clear and mountain tops 45 miles away can be plainly seen.

The view includes all of the city, showing the box factory on the east and reservoir hill on the west and a long stretch of valley land beyond. The sky in the painting is one of the most interesting features, the colors having been laid in with a palette knife giving the utmost brilliance of effect.
