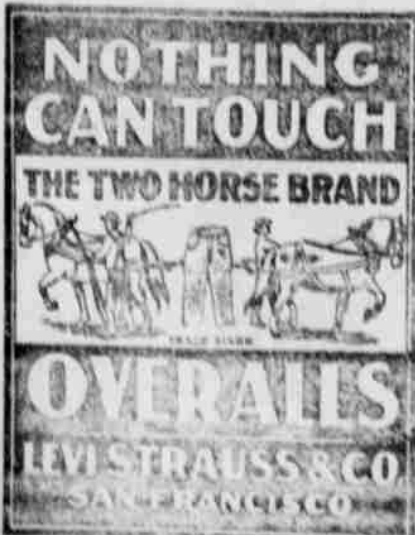

To Rid the House of Flies.

A correspondent writes to ask how
to use phrethrum powder for the de-
struction of flies. Directions will
be obtained when the powder is pur-
chased. It is largely used as an in-
secticide. There is a substitute fly-
killer that is probably better. The
London Lancet, a good authority,
says: "The best exterminating agent
is a weak solution of formaldehyde
in water (say two teaspoonfuls to the
pint), and this exposure has been
confirmed by others. It would ap-
pear that flies are attracted by a
weak solution of formaldehyde,
which they drink. Some die in the
water, others get as far only as the
immediate vicinity of the plate of
water, but all ultimately succumb,
and where they occur in large num-
bers, hundreds may be swept from
the floor. It is consoling to know
that by this method the flies have
died under a dose of a fluid which
is fatal to disease organisms, a fluid
also which is inoffensive and for
practical purposes nonpoisonous.
The method at once provides a
means of diminishing the scourge
and of securing to some extent what
is most desirable, the disinfection of
the slain."

Hughes Object of Solicitude.

It is interesting to note that cer-
tain big politicians are anxious to
insure a place on the supreme bench
for Governor Hughes so as to have it
ready for him when his term of of-
fice as governor expires. They have
mentioned this matter to the presi-
dent and they think he is favorably
inclined. The same men experienced
anxious solicitude regarding the
president and Roosevelt made the
tender of a place to him. The mat-
ter was discussed by the Taft family
generally and the conclusion reached
was not to accept, as it might inter-
fere with a presidential nomination.
This history is so recent it may not
be fair to presume that the family
and close friends of Governor
Hughes are likely to see the object
in pushing his name for a place on
the Supreme bench. There is more
