YOUNG BLOODS

TURN HOLDUPS

A dispatch from Coeur d'Alene,
Idaho, dated last Monday gives most
astonishing news.

Charged with holding up and rob-
bing Charles Reyn, a Swede, of
\$17.05, in the rear of the Lake City
hardware store, Marshal Nevlin, of
Los Angeles; Horace Peyton, son of
Colonel I. N. Peyton, Spokane mil-
litaire and pioneer, and Percy
Thompson, son of D. M. Thompson,
a wealthy Spokane man, were ar-
rested here last night, Thompson and
Peyton being later released on \$500
bonds each.

Nevlin was placed in jail and is
held under \$10,000 bonds because
the purse alleged to belong to the
Swede was found in his overcoat
pocket. Officers claim Reyn was en-
route home with a bottle of beer
under his arm, when three men took
him into an alley, claiming to be
policemen, and went through his
pockets. A crowd assembled, and
secret service men took the boys in
charge. Officer Steele held the boys
near the Silver Grill. Nevlin claims
he knows nothing of the purse in his
pocket or how it came to be there.

Terseness and Curtness.

Time was—and not so many years
since—when it was considered bad
form to say "Thanks" instead of
"Thank you," and children were
rightly rebuked by their elders for
so doing. Again, a vulgarity that
has even crept into the vocabulary
of those who might reasonably be
expected to speak with greater pre-
cision is "sorry," which is used in
lieu of "I beg your pardon."

The telephone is undoubtedly re-
sponsible for many abbreviations
which we now use in the course of
our speech, but the whole tendency
of the time is toward terseness, as
it is called. As often as not it comes
perilously near to curtness, and cer-
tainly it jars most unpleasantly on
sensitive ears to hear conversation
carried on in what can only be de-
scribed as the diction of invoice
clerks, to whom every moment and
almost every syllable counts.

The average person in private life
however, is not so pressed for time
that he or she must express them-
selves alphabetically and monosyl-
labically, to use two very long words.
Pedantry of speech bores and slang
is often most expressive, but this
cutting down and chipping off can
in no way be defended.

The Income Amendment.

Congressman Hawley of this dis-
trict has kindly furnished the
Courier, for publication, the pro-
posed amendment to the constitution
of the United States which will per-
mit a tax to be levied on incomes.
The joint resolutions passed by the
senate reads as follows:

"Resolved by the Senate and
House of Representatives of the
United States of America in Congress
assembled (two-thirds of each House
concurring therein), That the fol-
lowing article is proposed as an
amendment to the Constitution of
the United States, which, when rat-
ified by the legislatures of three-
fourths of the several states, shall
be valid to all intents and purposes
as a part of the Constitution:

"Article XVI. The Congress shall
have power to lay and collect taxes
on incomes, from whatever source
derived, without apportionment
among the several States, and with-
out regard to any census or enu-
meration."

"Passed the Senate July 9, 1909."
