HENEY WILL TRY

HERMANN IN FALL

Cleanup of Land-Fraud Cases Ordered by Attorney General Wickersham.

The Oregonian of Wednesday publishes a Washington special containing a letter from Attorney General Wickersham regarding the land-fraud cases and as some of these relate to Oregon defendants, they are important to our readers.

"I have given general instructions in all cases in which Mr. Heney is retained to make careful examination of the cases and, if they cannot be brought to trial within reasonable time with any prospect of success, that the indictments be dismissed, and have caused some indictments to be dismissed under these instructions."

Inquiry at the Department of Justice today brought forth the statement that "Binger Hermann will be brought to trial at Portland early this coming fall. Mr. Heney will personally conduct the prosecution."

No information was obtainable as to the case of J. N. Williamson or other land fraud defendants yet untied. No specific date has been fixed for beginning the Hermann trial, it is said.

When the above dispatch was read to him last night, United States District Attorney McCourt said he had been instructed by Attorney General Wickersham several months ago to examine all the cases pending here and determine which of these could be brought to trial within a reasonable time. Those that could not be disposed of without considerable delay were to be dismissed. Mr. McCourt said he had acted accordingly.

He has investigated every case in his charge and has made recommendations concerning all of them. He was advised that a representative of the Department of Justice would arrive here in May to pass upon these. This official will not be able to come to Portland until September. Mr. McCourt says he is prepared to proceed with his cases when the term opens in October and that they will be disposed of at that time as ordered by the department.

With regard to the Hermann trial, Mr. McCourt said it was the desire of the department that Mr. Heney should conduct that case. This was Mr. McCourt's wish also, for the reason that Mr. Heney is familiar with every phase of the case, having personally examined many of the witnesses, and knows also the theory under which he brought the action. Mr. McCourt, however, indicated that in the event Mr. Heney's engagements prevented his being here, the United States Attorney's office would conduct the Hermann case.

Killing Poison Ivy.

Below is a receipt for killing poison ivy taken from the Farm Journal. This method is quite as good for killing poison oak as ivy. In using the fire remedy great care should be taken not to allow the smoke to reach you as it will convey the poison to the eyes and face. There is considerable poison oak in this vicinity and it is highly desirable to get rid of it.

"Every summer we receive a flood of inquiries about how to eradicate poison ivy. There are various ways, but the following are the best we've ever found:

"Concentrated sulphuric acid will kill poison ivy. Dose each plant with a half teaspoonful to each stem, making the application during the growing season, every three weeks. If a large area is covered by the plants, spraying with arsenate of soda (1 pound to 20 gallons of water) will kill all vegetation. One application if the plants are young and tender, will do this. In the middle of summer, however, they should be cut down first, and more than one application given.

"Here's another way: A friend of ours puts straw along the stone fences, etc., infested with poison ivy, and then sets fire to the straw, repeating the operation at intervals until the plants give up trying to grow. This is easy, yet effective. By wearing gloves and approaching the vines on the windward side, no one should have any trouble in carrying out this treatment. Use a long-handled pitchfork."

HELIOGRAPHS TO BE

USED IN FORESTS

An Experiment Which May Lead to Very Useful and Important Results.

The Forest service is giving out for publication the following important information which will be read with interest by all who realize the importance of prompt efforts in subduing forest fires. The experiments which are to be made this season in calling for help in case of fires in our great forests will be of the greatest interest and if they prove successful will be the means of saving millions of dollars.

Experiments will be made during the summer with the standard heliographs which are now used in the War Department, for signaling on the national forests. One of these experiments will be on the Kaniksu National Forest, in Idaho, and the other on the Stanislaus Forest in California.

It is intended to discover whether these instruments will be of use on national forests to report fires or transmit other messages in areas where there is no quick method of communication.

The conditions of climate and latitude, as well as the species of inflammable trees in the two forests are sufficiently different to determine whether the instrument is suited to some localities and not to others.

Easy and quick communication to all parts of a forest must be had if fire is to be kept down. Anyone who knows the fearful damage wrought by forest fires on private and unprotected lands each year, will easily see that through fire patrol, use of telephone lines and other means of communication such as is maintained on the 195 million acres contained in the national forests, the losses can be reduced to a minimum.

For the administration and protection of the 148 national forests in nineteen states and territories and Alaska, the government spent \$2,526,098.02, or about one and one-half cents an acre for the calendar year 1908. Of this amount \$592,169.19 was spent for permanent improvements including the construction of 3,400 miles of trails, 100 miles of wagon roads, 3,200 miles of telephone lines and 40 miles of fire lines.

"Board Culture" of Onions.

Good crops of onions have been grown on a small scale by a peculiar system which may be called "board culture." One grower tried the plan last year on a patch of six or eight square rods. The onion field was prepared in the usual way with the rows 16 inches apart. Onion sets of the large, white varieties were then pricked out about 6 inches apart in the rows. Boards a foot wide of the same length as the rows were placed between the rows, leaving a space of 4 inches for the onions to grow. The labor of keeping the plants clean and cultivated was very light and a big yield was gathered. About 700 feet of cheap boards were required. No doubt if the rows had been only 9 to 10 inches apart, with 6-inch boards between the rows, a much larger quantity could have been grown on the same land.

NO URGENCY SAYS

GOVERNOR BENSON

Under present conditions Governor Benson will not call an extra session of the legislature to vote upon the proposed amendment to the United States constitution authorizing the enactment of legislation providing for a general income tax upon corporations and individuals. He said:

"The point has not suggested itself to me in the light of being urgent enough to call the special session of the legislature. Unless some unforeseen contingency should arise which would warrant the calling of an extra session, which I do not anticipate, I should think the matter could just as well wait the action of the next regular session. The calling of a special session to act upon the question has not been urged upon me by any person or even suggested, and I do not see any reason for haste."
