THERE IS TALK AGAIN RESIGNATION OF PINCHOT

Complications Likely to Follow If Forester Is Driven from the Service.

There are still repeated rumors that the chief of the Forest Service, Gifford Pinchot, will resign, but these rumors are each time promptly denied by his friends. It begins to look as if there is some truth in the report, on the principle where there is so much smoke there must be some fire. The country will come to the conclusion that Secretary Ballinger is making things disagreeable for Mr. Pinchot, so as to drive him into resigning. The Secretary is on the wrong side of this controversy and if he goes farther it will look as if he is favoring the corporations who have been making war on the Forest Service. The latest report to come from Washington is dated the 26th and is as follows:

It is rumored around Washington tonight that Gifford Pinchot, chief of the Forest Service, because of the interference with his administration by Secretary of the Interior Ballinger and Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, intends to resign and get out.

The rumor lacks confirmation, but appears to be given color by reason of the fact that Pinchot, for more than a month has neglected his Government work in order to collaborate with ex-Secretary Garfield in writing a history of the Roosevelt administration, and further because Pinchot is known to be deeply disheartened by reason of the attitude assumed by President Taft and his cabinet toward the forestry and conservation propagandists.

Pinchot's closest friends declare he will not resign, but will fight all who oppose him.

Should Pinchot be driven to sending in his resignation some ugly criticisms will be made regarding the policy of the Secretary of the Interior. He is charged already in inner circles as favoring the big corporations of the west.

For the lack of something better to talk about the Gold Hill News amuses people by this sort of device which the Medford Tribune gleefully grabs and inflicts on its readers:

"Many towns invite everyone to stop. Grants Pass not only invites the fish in Rogue river to stop, but sees that they do so, and there don't seem to be any way to prevent it. If the commercial club of that city were as successful with the home-seekers as the fishermen are with the fish, grass would soon sprout through the paved street of Medford and Gold Hill would be a hole in the ground."

Material for newspapers must be scarce in both Gold Hill and Medford. What has Grants Pass got to do with keeping the fish from going up? The fish warden says he is going to build a fishway in addition to the one already in the dam which will insure more fish going up the river, but so far he takes it out in talk. He has been trying to make himself popular in Medford by talking for publication. He says that fishermen turn out the lights at the Ament dam and he imagines that they are doing or are going to do something wrong. He admits that he is afraid to go out after dark without a light and so he runs over to Medford and tells about bugaboos which he suspects inhabit the river below the dam. Sensible people do not take any stock in charges which have in no instance been proven. Grants Pass people are not to blame because Gold Hill and Medford fishermen have "fisherman's luck."
