Grows Eloquent on Alaska.

Dr. J. Whitcomb Brouger, whose eloquence delighted so many of the citizens of this county on the 4th of July, has since made the South-eastern Alaska trip and last Sunday night he commenced his sermon at the White Temple with a reference to his recent visit to the north country, in which he paid the following tribute to that great wonderland which is larger than seven ordinary states and which is producing more wealth every year than it originally cost the government. We copy an extract from the doctor's talk, which may be set down as true eloquence: "Alaska has been declared to be a barren, worthless, God-forsaken country, whose only products are icebergs and polar bears. But in the face of all opposition and ridicule, Seward and Sumner, two great American statesmen, looked to a future reward and insisted upon the acquisition of Alaska. We paid \$7,200,000 for that great country and have taken from it already \$400,000,000.

Delight to the Eye.

"All the way from Seattle to Skagway and out to Sitka the eye is delighted and the soul is charmed by the kaleidoscopic scenes presented on either side of the steamer as she gently glides along the way. It is possible to sit all day on the deck of the steamer and never grow weary of the changing view in the scenery presented.

"After leaving the town of Wrangell, about 10 p. m., we witnessed a wonderful sunset. Every land may occasionally have a beautiful sunset, but I doubt if there is any place where the sun going down casts such a delicate shade of coloring as on this inland sea. It looked like a sea of opal set in mountains of gold. We had been looking upon this scene of beauty nearly two hours when the clouds began sending forth a gentle mist, and instantly there appeared spanning the heavens from horizon to horizon a perfect rainbow. In the west the golden sun is sinking beyond the mountains, the eastern sky draped in the beauty of the rainbow, and the whole earth bathed in colors so delicate and soft that to touch would be to destroy them."

Important Investigations.

How long will timber remain commercially valuable after it has been swept over by a forest fire? Timber land owners, as well as the Federal Government are much interested in obtaining this information, and the government has just begun an investigation of a large number of fire areas in Oregon and Washington in order to determine, if possible, the length of time which will elapse after a forest fire before the timber deteriorates to such a condition as to decrease its commercial value.

The agencies which cause timber to decay, and encourage the attack of wood borers are undoubtedly influenced to a greater or less degree by the intensity of the original fire and the climatic conditions and altitude of the burned areas.

All the information in connection with this investigation will be obtained first hand by the Forest Service, either from government or timber land, or from private holdings where logging operations are under way.

In this connection the Forest Service has also undertaken an investigation to determine the relative strength of green and fire-killed timber. The material which is to be tested is being sawed at the Eastern & Western Lumber Company of Portland, Oregon, where it will be surfaced to exact sizes and then transported to Seattle, where tests will be made in connection with the Forest Service exhibit at the A-Y-P. Exposition.

The fire-killed trees which are to yield material for these tests were selected by representatives of the Forest Service on the holdings of the Clarke County Timber Company of Portland, Oregon, near Yacolt, Washington. This timber was burned over seven years ago and represents fairly well, the average of burned timber found in the Pacific Northwest. The logs which vary from three to four feet in diameter, were sawed into 32-foot lengths. These are being manufactured into 16-foot floor joists and bridge stringers.

The results of these tests are being anticipated with great interest by Forest Service engineers and by the lumbermen of the Northwest, because they are expected to disapprove the opinion generally held regarding the strength of fire-killed timber.
