### Bryan's Texas Farm.

It has transpired that William Jennings Bryan about a year ago purchased 160 acres of fine land in the Rio Grande valley near Mission, Texas, and will make of it one of the finest farms in the whole country. The entire quarter section is under irrigation and a considerable part of it is in cultivation. The farm is to be a place of real beauty; the preliminary work of beautification has already received a good start. A broad, curved driveway leading from the main road to the site of the proposed residence has been laid out and upon each side of it has been planted rows of date and palm trees. These trees are doing well and have made a good growth during the summer. To the left of the driveway is an orchard of several acres of young English walnut and pecan trees, while bordering the driveway on the right is a large orchard of orange trees.

In addition to these trees Bryan has had many acres planted in fig trees, lemon trees and many other varieties of tropical and semi-tropical fruit and nut bearing trees. He sent to remote parts of the world for

strange varieties of trees and plants which he has had set out upon his farm. One of the attractive features of this farm is a large vineyard which will soon be a producer of marketable fruit.

### Hard for Man and Beast.

A mosquito scourge never before equaled is spreading over the Gulf Coast section of Texas, causing actual damage to cattle and other animals. Work in many of the rice fields in southeast and southwest coast counties has been abandoned because of the myriad of mosquitoes attacking the laborers, whose only protection are boots and thick gloves. Owing to the heat, the workmen cannot wear thick clothes, and handkerchiefs around the head and neck are easily pierced by the long-billed mosquitoes.

Thousands of head of cattle sought the gulf and bays and other waterways, to get away from the pests. Forced to stand in water neck-deep, the cattle refuse to come out to eat, and unless relief from the mosquitoes comes soon many cattle will die.

Several of the coast line roads are operating their trains without passengers because the mosquitoes in dense clouds literally drove passengers under the seats, notably on the Gulf and Interstate road, which skirts the gulf shore for thirty-five miles. Even on Galveston Island, with a stiff gulf breeze blowing, cattle and horses are suffering, and tons of oil are being used to drive away the large mosquitoes.

### Taft Takes the Steamer Mississippi.

President Taft's managers have arranged to take him from St. Louis to New Orleans on the government steamer Mississippi. The president will attend the Deep Waterways convention which takes place in New Orleans on October 30 to November 2. Preparations are being made to have a large fleet of steamers escort the president's vessel and these will be loaded with United States senators, members of congress and St. Louis business men. The Deep Waterways convention will be attended this year by a large number of the most prominent men in the country. The fact that the president will interest himself in the cause will make it the popular gathering of the year.

Secretary Rathburn had regarded as a hoax the report that these initials of the former president were on the packages, and he at once pronounced them to be the evidence of a trick by newspaper men. It will be some days before the casks can be gotten into and their contents inspected.

In the last few weeks he had become so enthusiastic over socialist doctrines that he was in the habit of collecting crowds about him at all hours of the day and night, until the neighbors complained, and his parents produced him in court and asked that his mind be examined by experts.

### Only Woman Pensioner Dead.

Mrs. Sarah E. Thompson, the only woman carried on the rolls of the pension office as a soldier of the Union army, died last Thursday.

Mrs. Thompson was recognized as a soldier, largely because of services she rendered the latter part of the civil war, by discovering and reporting to federal troops the hiding place of John Morgan, the Confederate general who invaded and terrorized Ohio.

### Mistaken for a Deer.

A dispatch from Eugene, Ore., dated Monday, says John Mathews, of Colburg, was shot and seriously wounded by Virgil Clover while hunting in the mountains northeast of Eugene on Sunday afternoon. Clover mistaking him for a deer. The rifle bullet entered Mathews' groin and lodged somewhere in his body. Mathews was taken to Colburg last night and brought to the Eugene hospital today. While the surgeons express hope for his recovery, they say the wound is very serious.
