GREATER GALICE DISTRICT

(Continued from Page 1.)

Galice Mining Notes.

The Carleton group of nine claims is being steadily developed by Messrs. Cheney, Willmarth and Mears. This group covers the Big Yank ledge at its crossing of the south fork of Galice creek. Two tunnels, a crosscut to the east and some open cut work demonstrate the existence there of a wide and continuous ore body.

The Black Jack group, owned by Robert Jackson, lies on Quartz creek to the west of and in close proximity to the Sugar Pine. This group has yielded more than \$8000 in free gold and promising, as it does, a strong, persistent vein, its further development is awaited with interest. It is

confidently believed the Black Jack will be one of the notable mines of the camp.

For a year past Messrs. Fassett and Sutherland have been engaged in opening up a group of claims at the head of Blanchard gulch, and recent developments have well rewarded their labor. They have been cross-cutting a wide ledge of pyritiferous ore and in nearing the foot-wall have cut into a grade of quartz that carries good values in gold. This recent strike, in addition to a considerable body of free milling ore previously developed, gives them a property with a very promising future.

Over at the head of Little Silver creek, Peter Cheldelin is clearing ground and making ready for his winter's hydraulic run. The Duncan boys are also opening up two ledges, one of which carries free gold, on the divide between the headwaters of Big and Little Silver.

Superintendent Curtis Hudson has a large force of men engaged preparing for a big winter's run on the Old Channel hydraulic property. The ten mile ditch has been repaired, the upper reservoir deepened and enlarged and by the time a sufficient head of water is obtained the property will be in good condition for mining operations. It is reported that the transfer to the new owners will be made as soon as the preparatory work is finished and piling commences.

Dan Green, the Galice pioneer who

is superintendent for the Galice Placer Mining company, a Pennsylvania corporation, has engaged a crew of men and commenced piling with a good head of water. Operation this winter will be conducted on the Harmon & Green bar on the north side of the creek, just below the slide of historic memory.

Air compressor plants are being installed at both the Golden Wedge and the Oriole mines. The new sawmill at the Oriole is now ready for operations. The lower adit of this mine is within a few feet of the ore body, which will be cut within a day or two. At the Golden Wedge a winze is being sunk on the ore body from the end of the drift. A crew of fifteen men is employed.

North of the Sugar Pine the Hidden Treasure group, owned by A. McLeod, is being developed with a small crew of men. Preparations are being made to sink a shaft this winter and some further work will probably be done in the tunnel, where a vein of quartz has already been reached.
