May Settle the Harriman Suits.
 President Taft has been appealed to by railroad officials to devise or sanction a plan to settle out of court the government's suit to compel the dissolution of the merger of the Harriman lines. The case will not be dropped, it is said, except upon such terms as will look to a correction of the evils complained of in the government suit, or unless the government can be shown to be completely in error.

The suit against the Harriman lines, which consists in chief of the Union Pacific, the Southern Pacific, the Oregon Short Line and the Ore-

gon Railroad and Navigation company, was begun following an inquiry before the Interstate Commerce Commission. It was during these hearings that the enormous stockholdings of the Harriman lines in other railroads first came to be generally known.

Prominent republicans are urging Speaker Cannon to announce that he will not again be a candidate for speaker. They tell him that if he is an issue in the campaign the republicans will lose the next house. Congressman Howland of the Cleveland, O., district and Ned Taylor of Columbus, O., strict organization men, announce themselves as insurgents because if they support Cannon they fear defeat. So far Cannon says he will not be driven, but will run again.

A Handsome Recognition.
 The Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research of New York has been presented, by the Pasteur Institute of Paris, through the French consul-general, with a replica in bronze of Louis Pasteur by Paul Debois, in recognition of the aid rendered by the Rockefeller Institute in the recent epidemic of cerebro-spinal meningitis in France. Statisties show that employment of anti-meningitis serum furnished by the Rockefeller Institute, reduced the deaths of those afflicted from 80 per cent or more to 15 per cent or less.

The latest in millinery is a creation that is shaped exactly like the Quaker bonnet of fifty years ago, but very much more elaborate, are some styles that greet us among the new consignments of hats and bonnets. 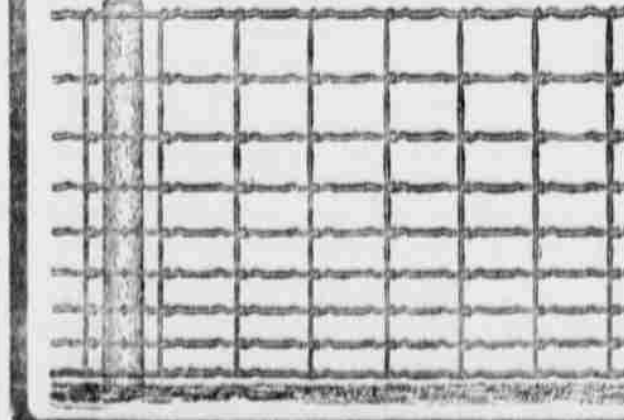
