Many of our number attended church services in town both morning and evening last Sunday.

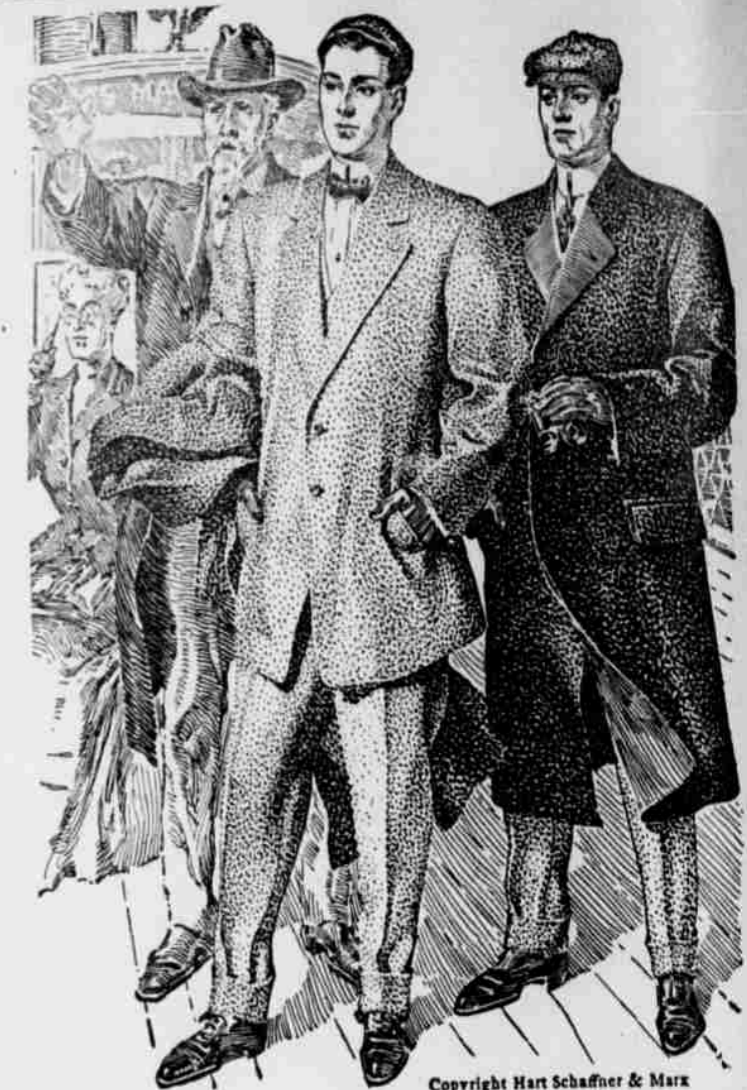
Earl Engels, wife and daughter were out Sunday afternoon.
