Fruit Candy.

Dutch Apple Pudding.
 One egg, one cup milk, one pint flour, two teaspoons baking powder, two tablespoons butter, saltspoon of salt. Mix and spread dough one-half inch thick on buttered cake tin. Cut pared and cored apples into eighths and press into the dough. Sprinkle with granulated sugar and bake. Serve with cream and sugar.

German Meat Croquettes.

Make into croquettes and fry in hot fat.

Walnut Wafers.
 Beat two eggs until light, then add one-half pound light brown sugar that has been rolled fine, one-half pound chopped nuts, three even teaspoonfuls of flour, a pinch of salt and one-half teaspoonful of baking powder. Drop small spoonfuls on buttered pans and bake until light brown.

This spring, however, experiments have been made with a mixture of lime water and oil and these have been found mix well and the combination has been giving satisfactory results.
