Quartz Mining Revolutionized

LIQUOR SELLER SENTENCED

Max Weiss, Wealthy Roseburg Man, May Go to Jail.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 18.—Convicted of selling intoxicating liquors contrary to law, Max Weiss, proprietor of a local cold storage plant and one of the wealthiest residents of Douglas county, was sentenced by Judge Coke today to pay a fine of \$400 and serve 30 days in the county jail.

Weiss' attorneys were allowed 60 days in which to appeal the case to the supreme court. There are three similar indictments pending against Weiss in the circuit court and according to the district attorney at least one of them will be tried during the present term.

OREGON CITY, Oct. 12—Whitman county, Wash., has three murder cases at the present term of the superior court, all directly traceable to bad whisky.

One of the murderers killed his man because he was reprimanded by the victim's father for giving liquor to a boy. Another killed his brother-in-law a drunk-en row, and the third man is on trial for killing a man in a fight in a Colfax saloon. The cause of temperance will be materially aided in Colfax by these three trials; but the lesson will not be heeded by the saloon men, for it is in the small city or town that the business is conducted with the least possible regard for decency.
