#### REWARD OFFERED FOR DETECTION FIRE SETTERS

Hereafter, during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1911, unless otherwise ordered, and thereafter, provided congress shall make the necessary appropriation or authorize the payment thereof, the department of agriculture will pay the following rewards:

First. Not exceeding \$250, and 95 not less than \$50, for information leading to the arrest and conviction 77 of any person, in any United States court, on the charge of wilfully and maliciously setting on fire, or caus-08 ing to be set on fire, any timber, un-40 derbrush or grass upon the lands of the United States within a national

Second. Not exceeding \$100, and not less than \$25, for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any person, in any United States court, on the charge of building a 10 fire on lands of the United States 79 within a national forest, in or near 25 any forest timber or other inflammable material, and leaving said fire before the same has been totally extinguished.

Third, All officers and employees 36 of the department of agriculture are barred from receiving reward for information leading to the arrest and 03 conviction of any person or persons committing either of the above offenses.


