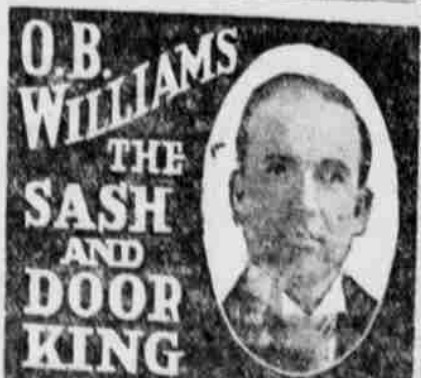

LOCAL OPTION CASE.

Monday before Judge Calkins
at the county court the demurrers
to the liquor indictments were ar-
gued by R. G. Smith, in behalf of de-
fendants, and by District Attorney
Mulkey for the state.

The issue is whether or not the
local option liquor law is in force
in Grants Pass since the adoption of
the home rule amendment to the
constitution. In other words, wheth-
er the defendants, Williams, Hearn,
Pilkington, Whitsett and Howell
can be tried now for violations com-
mitted prior to the adoption of the
home rule amendment.

Counsel for defense argued that
the constitution is self-operating,
and as soon as the home rule
amendment was proclaimed by the
governor that cities had the right
to license and to regulate the sal-
oons. It was contended that this
case was exactly the same as the
Medford case of Hall vs. Dunn.

Counsel for defense cited another
case from Kentucky which was al-
most identical with the one tried
here. It was held in that case that
the state could not prosecute for vi-
olations of the law after the enact-
ment of a general law taking a city
out of local option territory.

At the time the Medford charter
was amended local option was in
force in all of Jackson county, in-
cluding the city of Medford, but af-
ter the amendment to said charter
in 1905 the prohibition order made
in June, 1905, in pursuance of the
first local option election held in
November, 1904, was annulled by
the amendment to the charter.

In Hall vs. Dunn, 52 Ore., page
486, the court said:

"Prior to the amendment of the
fundamental law of Oregon mention-
ed, the legislative assembly possess-
ed plenary power to alter the char-
ter of Medford so as to take the ter-
ritory embraced within the bound-
aries of that city out of the provi-
sions of the local option liquor law." Of
course, if this could then be done
by the legislature, it can now be
done by an amendment to the con-
stitution."

District Attorney Mulkey contend-
ed for the state that the home rule
amendment was not effective until
an election was held in Grants Pass
on the question of prohibition, and
that such election could not be held
until November, 1911, or November,
1912, and that the local option order
made in 1908 by the county court
under the local option law would
continue in effect within Grants
Pass. Therefore the defendants
could be prosecuted for such viola-
tions.

The following was the brief on de-
murrer argued by R. G. Smith, Esq.:

"The home rule amendment pro-
vides that the exclusive power over
the sale of intoxicating liquors is in-
vested in incorporated towns and
cities. The amendment repeals by
implication all laws in conflict with
it. Prior to the enactment of this
amendment the city of Grants Pass
had been incorporated and given the
power to prohibit, regulate and li-
cense the sale of liquors within the
city, but that authority was suspend-
ed by the voting of prohibition un-
der the local option law. Under the
local option law the authority to
enact prohibition in the county is
vested in the voters in the county.
By a majority vote prohibition can
be enacted throughout the county.
The home rule amendment gives the
exclusive power to regulate the li-
quor traffic within incorporated
towns to the municipality. The two
are absolutely inconsistent. The au-
thority to prohibit can not be vest-
ed in both a municipality and the
county that embraces the municipali-
ty. Therefore the latter act im-
pliedly repeals the local option law
in relation to the vote by counties
and any order made in pursuance of
such election. One or the other
must yield.

This amendment to the constitu-
tion became effective on the pro-
clamation of the governor. There-
fore it is part of the organic law of
the state and supreme until amend-
ed.

After taking the matter under ad-
visement the court adjourned un-
til next Friday, when a ruling is ex-
pected from Judge Calkins.
