

ESPERANTOS HAVE A NOVEL ENTERTAINMENT

The Grants Pass Esperanto club was entertained in a novel manner on Monday evening at the home of Mrs. Edward G. Harris on East A street.

Much amusement was occasioned by the efforts of the club members to learn "Cio" (everything), a game in which the participants must speak in Esperanto. A dainty luncheon was served by the hostess, after which Misses Kimbley and Harris favored the company with several choice musical selections.

Perhaps few people in Grants Pass know of this Esperanto club or its able teacher, Miss Celia Doerner. Yet in Portland and in other cities of the state it is known as the only club of its kind in Josephine county. This new language, Esperanto, which it is hoped may soon become the instrument of communication between all the nations of the world, thereby bringing about "peace on earth, good will towards men," has already secured such a strong hold as to be used by manufacturing firms, railroads, hotels, and other business concerns as the most expedient and profitable way of introducing themselves to other countries. The Portland Commercial club has published a little booklet in Esperanto, setting forth the attractions, resources and possibilities of our state, and spreading Oregon's fame around the globe. This booklet has brought the club more inquiries, especially from foreign countries, than any other literature they have sent out. There are several Esperanto clubs in Portland, and the language is being studied in seventeen counties in the state. The fact that the American Congress of Esperantists will meet in the Rose City next June has helped to increase interest in the study.

NEW WAREHOUSE AND FACTORY AT SIDETRACK

Application has been made for a strip 320 feet along the Southern Pacific right of way on East Front street and running back to the side track of the company adjoining the ice plant on the east, upon which Messrs. McKinstry, Courtney and Hair will erect a large warehouse and factory for the manufacture of all sorts of cement building material. Mention of this enterprise was made some time ago in The Courier. The new factory will be one of the most extensive for the manufacture of all forms of tile, brick stone blocks, curbing, culverts, etc., in this part of the state. The new power tile machine that is now on its way to Grants Pass for this factory is one of the largest used in any like factory on the coast and will be run by a 15-horsepower electric motor. When the plant is running at its full capacity it will employ upwards of 12 men. Though working under numerous difficulties, the firm is turning out a large amount of material at the present time, samples of their foundation blocks on exhibition, with but three weeks of seasoning, made under a pressure of over 80,000 pounds, have almost the appearance of solid granite. In speaking to a reporter of the future of the enterprise, it was stated that there is a large and growing demand for cement work of this kind on account of the great activity in building circles of the city this spring. Cement is becoming a popular building material in this and other sections, and the promoters anticipate and are preparing for a heavy run of business, believing that a Grants Pass product for Grants Pass people should be a winner. Each enterprise of this sort not only supplies local needs but helps to give work to those who want it and adds its quota to a regular payroll.

AMERICANS AT CALEXICO THROW UP BRESTWORKS

CALEXICO, Cal., Mar. 15.—General Berthold and Leyva slipped out of town this morning headed toward Picoch Pass. The arrival last night Junta is believed to have been responsible, as preparations to move was started immediately afterwards. Captain McDonald and 14 men were left behind to hold the trenches at Mexicali. Immediately after the United States soldiers at Calexico began throwing breastworks along the line, lending an air of mystery to the whole affair. It was generally believed that a battle near Picoch Pass was expected and the breastworks were to be used in preventing fugitives from crossing the line.

SPRAY YOUR TREES.

Professor O'Garra has issued the following notice to spray:

"It will be only a short time when fruit trees will be blooming, and before this time comes all persons owning, renting or otherwise having charge of city property, upon which fruit trees, vines and shrubs are growing must have these fruit trees, vines and shrubs sprayed with lime-sulphur solution. This is in accordance with the horticultural regulations of this state, and is an order given by the district commissioner of this district. If a tree, vine or shrub is worth having at all, it is surely worth keeping clean. It is your duty as citizens to observe the sanitary laws and regulations, both as to our own health and the health of plants we grow. Fruit trees, vines, rose bushes, etc., must be sprayed regardless of their proximity to residences or other buildings. If owners feel that the spray will mar the paint on the buildings, then some arrangement should be made to protect the buildings when the spraying is done.

"All spraying must be done by April 7, which is the limit set for owners to have this work done. After that date the inspectors will either spray or cut down the trees at their discretion and at the owner's expense. This decision has been made and will be upheld by the district commissioner of horticulture and the county commissioners of the county."

CHANGES BEING MADE IN FIRST NATIONAL BANK

The changes to be made in the banking rooms of the First National Bank will be in keeping with the growth of the town and the institution. Two vaults, one for bank use exclusively, and the other for safety deposit boxes, will be built just at the rear of the present vault, which will be taken out. These vaults will be entirely fireproof and burglar proof. They will be lined with chrome steel lining, and the cement work will be reinforced with interlaced steel bars. The other equipment of the vaults will be of similar substantial material.

In the banking room itself marble and mahogany furniture will replace that in use at present. Special arrangements will be made for greater convenience of the public: coupon booths, ladies' rest room, more tellers' windows, larger lobby, etc. The working space for clerks and officers will be increased and rearranged for greater convenience. In every way the First National Bank will be prepared to handle the increased patronage which has come and which will continue to come with the increasing prosperity of Grants Pass and Josephine County.

The contractor for the cement and brick work on the remodeling has begun excavating at the rear of the building. This is for the purpose of erecting a temporary vault adjoining the room to be used as banking office while the changes are being made in the present quarters. The bank will move into the temporary office about March 15th, and the new equipment and vaults will not be ready for occupancy for another two months.

SYSTEM OF "HECKLING"

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15.—A policy of "heckling" has been decided upon by republican leaders, as the house minority attitude towards Speaker Champ Clark and the democrats in the coming extra session. The rules of the house are full of pitfalls for the unwary. "Uncle Joe" Cannon, as speaker, had to trust to Asher C. Hinds at least three or four times a day for parliamentary rulings.

There are two parliamentary experts on the democratic side—Fitzgerald of New York and Sherley of Kentucky—and many other good rules men. Among the republicans there are Hinds, the greatest living authority on the house rules; "Jim" Mann, of Illinois; Marlin Olmsted, of Pennsylvania; Sereno E. Payne, of New York, and Cannon himself.

Representative Mann recently gave proof of his parliamentary sagacity by a mysterious filibuster against the omnibus claims bill. A perfectly good majority in the house had to resign itself to Mann's whims. There was no stopping him.

"I think we will have a good deal of fun after April 4," said Mann here today. "Things will begin to happen right off the bat."

WILL TRY TO UNIONIZE RAILWAY POSTAL SERVICE

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15.—The present progress of organization undertaken by the American Federation of Labor for the unionization of the entire railway postal service will necessitate the issuance of over fifty charters to the different chapters. The postoffice department, especially the postmaster general, does not look upon this movement of the railway clerks with favor. President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, however, declares that he will take every post-office clerk in the service under the protection of the labor federation and that it makes no difference what attitude the department will take. Secretary Morrison of the American Federation of Labor, says that more than twenty-five charters have already been issued and that as many more will soon be granted. The federation makes no secret of the fact that it intends to give aid in every manner possible to the clerks. If necessary—and accord-
