DEATH OF BEN DIMICK

After an illness of several weeks duration caused by a paralytic stroke Benjamin Dimick died at his home 1 1/2 miles west of this city early Saturday morning at the age of 69 years.

In the death of Mr. Dimick Grants Pass loses one of its oldest and best known pioneers. He was born in Schuyler county, Illinois, November 5, 1842, being the youngest of ten children. At the age of 9 years he came to Oregon with his parents and in 1869 was married to Miss Almira Bungartner in Benton county. Six children were born to this union, all of whom are living; Mrs. Dimick also surviving her husband. In 1870 Mr. Dimick located in Josephine county, where he took up a homestead of 146 acres one and a half miles from Grants Pass, and where he was living and engaged in dairy business at the time of his death. Deceased was a faithful member of the Newman M. E. church and was a true Christian gentleman, who held the highest respect of his fellow citizens. His death is a sad loss, not only to his family, but to the community. The funeral services will be held at the Newman M. E. church Monday afternoon, at 2:30, with Rev. D. H. Leech in charge.


