**DECLARES LIGHT METER CHARGES ILLEGAL**

People of Medford hereafter will refuse to pay rent for electric light meters, on advice of their city attorney.

At a meeting two weeks ago of the Medford city council, Councilman W. W. Eifert made a protest regarding the practice of the Rogue River Electric company in forcing patrons to pay rent for meters.

As a result of Eifert's protest the council empowered City Attorney Neff to look into the matter and report an opinion. The city attorney filed a report yesterday, in which he declares the collecting of rent illegal, and advises Medford residents to refuse in future to pay this charge.

The Mail Tribune of Medford reports the matter as follows:

"Residents of the city of Medford who use electricity for lighting or heating purposes and do not pay the Rogue River Electric company rent on meters which the company installs to measure use of current, according to an opinion filed with the city council by City Attorney Porter J. Neff.

Mr. Neff states that the proper method to follow in this regard is for the property owner to refuse to pay the meter rent and then if the company starts to cut off the lights, to seek an injunction restraining them from doing so. Mr. Neff states that if he is so instructed by the city council he will act as an attorney for any property owner in a test case.

"As the Rogue River Electric company has fully 100 meters in use in the city for which they collect a rental of 25 cents a month, the revenue they gain from the source is fully \$250 a month."

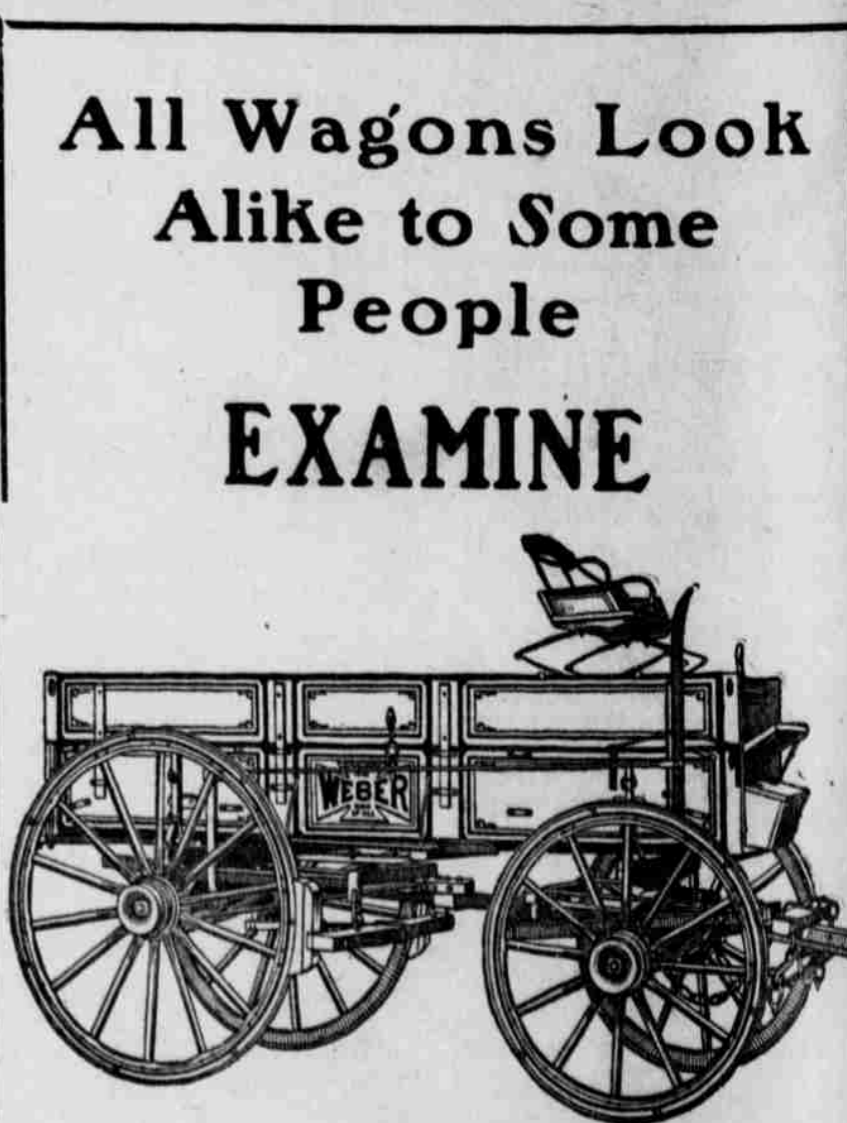
