IMPROVEMENTS FOR PASCO

Plans Adopted That Will Necessitate Considerable Activity in Street Improvement Work This Year

PASCO, Wash., April 28.—Pasco stands for progress. Last night the Council awarded contracts that provide for the immediate paving and improvement of the main streets of the city.

For some months the Council committee has been busy with trips of the Pacific Northwest for the purpose of determining the most desirable kind of paving for use in this climate. Their report covered wide experiences by various cities, with concrete, asphalt, hessam, westrumite, bitulithic, brick and wood blocks. The committee reported unanimously in favor of bitulithic. Bids were received from companies, representing most of the pavements above named. Prices varied considerably a number being offered for less per square yard, than bitulithic, but in view of the favorable reports in the towns where this form of pavement has been tested for a long period of years, it was considered that bitulithic is unquestionably the cheapest in the long run.

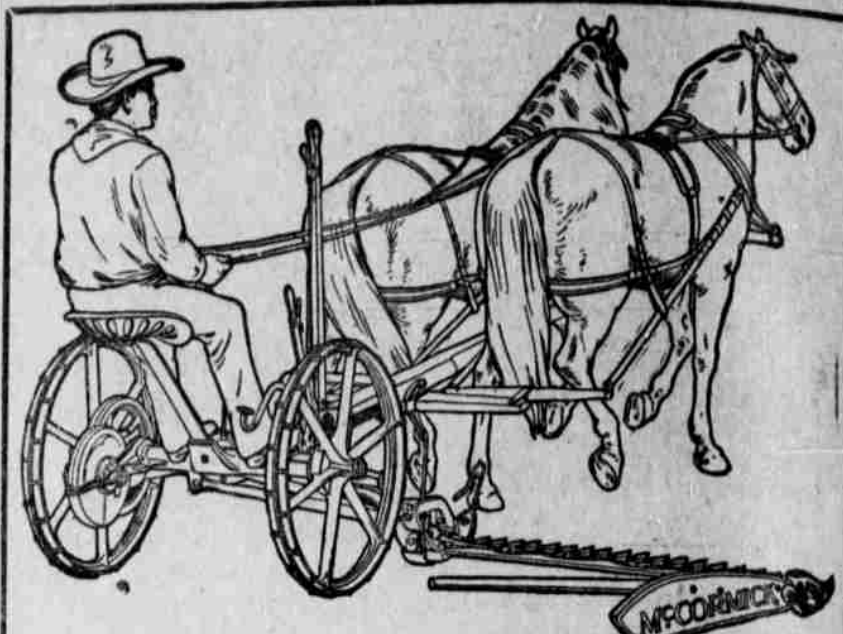
