PROMISING MINE SHOWN  
TO CONTAIN BIG VALUES

In the plan of The Courier to give  
publicity to every mining enterprise  
of worth in Josephine county, no  
quartz property so far described in  
these columns gives greater promise  
of making a genuine mine than one  
now being developed on Slate creek  
by W. H. Ramsey. The property con-  
sists of a group of three claims and  
lies 20 miles south of Grants Pass  
and at the head of Slate creek.  
Adolph Maier, mining engineer of  
Grants Pass, and manager of the  
Michigan mine in this county, was  
called to the property last week to  
make an examination for the owner.  
Mr. Maier spent several days on the  
property and thoroughly inspected the  
ledge for some distance. As the owner  
has no secrets to withhold, he was  
not averse to the facts regarding his  
property becoming known, and Mr.  
Maier, as a result, gave a representa-  
tive of The Courier a description of  
the property, which is in part as fol-  
lows:

Ramsey is developing one of the  
three claims known as the Golden  
West. On the claim are two ledges,  
one 20 feet wide carrying heavy sul-  
phide and some oxidized ore, and one  
8 feet wide carrying oxidized porphy-  
ritic ore. The first ledge is on a con-  
tact of serpentine and slate. The  
second is a fissure vein. Both ledges  
carry generous gold values, as will  
be seen a few lines below.

On the contact vein development  
consists of a 50-foot tunnel and a  
prospect shaft of 20 feet. The ore  
from the oxidized portion of this  
ledge Mr. Ramsey is putting through  
a concrete arastra. He necessarily  
is losing a large portion of the val-  
ues, but even with this crude machine  
he is making good clean-ups. Ramsey  
has been running the arastra 12  
months.

The eight-foot fissure vein crosses  
the contact vein at the point of the  
20-foot shaft. The porphyritic ox-  
idized quartz occurs at this point  
and an assay by Binns gave \$74 for  
the eight feet. Eight feet from the  
contact the ledge matter pans rich,  
several tests giving 50 cents to the  
pan.

Other tests made from the property  
show: Assay by C. F. Bowers,  
of Sacramento, and taken from across  
the 20-foot ledge returned \$24.59.

Ore from face of tunnel, assay by  
George H. Binns, of Grants Pass, re-  
turned \$48.

Amalgamation tests in crosscut  
vein \$58.40.

Amalgamation test in shaft, \$75-  
60.

Amalgamation test in main tun-  
nel \$23.40.

General average of amalgamation  
tests \$24.80.

The ore concentrates 21.17 into  
one, giving an average value of \$232-  
55. The concentration test was also  
made by Mr. Maier.

The property lies one mile and a  
half from a good wagon road, and  
a road to the mine can be construc-  
ted for a minimum expenditure on  
such work. Timber for all neces-  
sary mining purposes is abundant,  
and water from Slate creek is a cheap  
power directly accessible. Ramsey  
runs his arastra, a 20-foot wheel,  
with water power of the creek.

High-grade streaks and crevices  
can not compare in value with a prop-  
erty such as this Ramsey possesses,  
and it is such mines that will make  
Josephine county great. Recent suc-  
cesses in perfecting cheap treat-  
ments on the ground for base ores  
show what can be done in this coun-  
ty with the multitude of auriferous  
pyrite ledges, and in addition to re-  
covery of the free gold values in ox-  
idized ores, the base ores in such  
big and wide ledges as is owned by  
Ramsey will be easily reduced and  
thereby net large returns in the yel-  
low metal.

Mr. Maier considers the Ramsey  
group of the most valuable ones of  
Josephine county, and predicts a pros-  
perous future for the mine if man-  
aged correctly.

MARKET EXCHANGE BLOCK  
CHANGES OWNERSHIP

Dr. W. H. Flanagan and J. M. Teth-  
erow have purchased from A. E. Edg-  
erton and Jud Taylor 50x100 feet at  
the southwest corner of H and Fifth  
street. The site is occupied by the  
Wholesale Market Exchange, now be-  
ing conducted by the Axtell Commis-  
sion company. The purchase price  
was \$6,750.

Edgerton and Taylor owned 100x  
100, buying from W. H. Ahlf. They  
paid Ahlf \$8,000 for the 100 feet  
square.

Mr. Tetherow last night stated that  
in purchasing the property he and  
Dr. Flanagan did so as an investment,  
purely.

Adjoining the market exchange,  
which is a brick building two stories  
in height, is a cheap two-story, frame  
building. This the new owners will  
raise and in its place erect a brick of  
two stories, to be tied to the present  
brick building. They will not build  
at present, however, but later when  
demand comes for more business  
blocks.

Mr. Tetherow said that he looks  
for Fifth street and seventh, at a  
day not far distant, to become the  
equal of Sixth street as it now is, and  
that now is the time to get in the  
real estate game in Grants Pass. He  
has great faith in this city and its  
future.

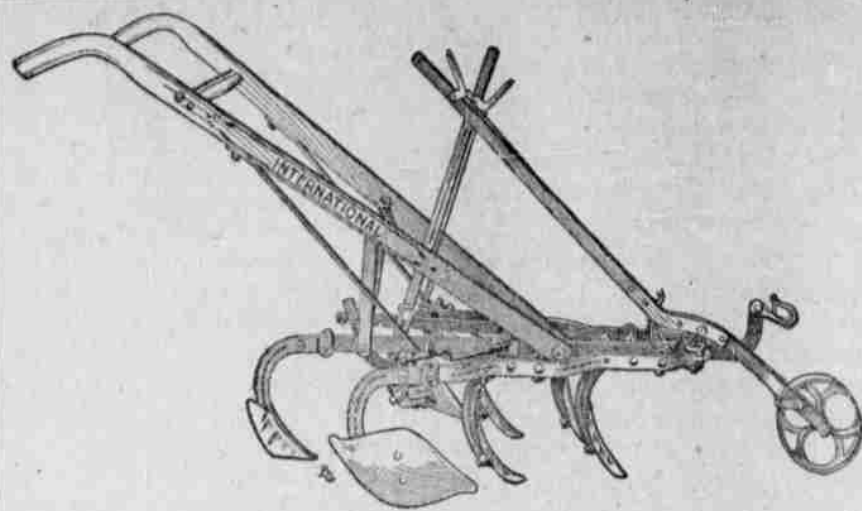

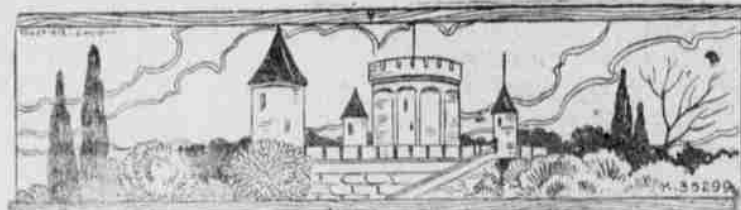
