PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY COURT AT THE REGULAR JULY, 1911, TERM.

Court met Wednesday, July 15th, 1911, pursuant to law, there being present:

H. S. Woodcock, Commissioner, C. L. Barlow, Commissioner, S. F. Cheshire, Clerk, and Will C. Smith, Sheriff.

In the matter of the organization of an irrigation district in Josephine County, Oregon: Petition was duly filed, together with a sufficient bond as required by law, and the final hearing in said matter was set for July 26th, 1911, at ten o'clock, a. m., at the Court room at the Court House, in the city of Grants Pass, Oregon.

In the matter of the petition of Walter S. Hulbert et al., for a county road in sections 4, 9, 10, 15, township 36, S. R., 6 west; the said matter was heard upon the report of the county board of road viewers, and the matter taken under advisement to be passed upon at such time as the Court shall be more fully advised.

In the matter of the change of a portion of the county road near Love Station on the Kerby to Jacksonville road:

The matter was heard upon the report of the county board of road viewers and the changes and the appropriation of the lands necessary thereto, was made in accordance with said report.

The resignation of A. C. Howland, Justice of the Peace in and for Lucky Queen Precinct was accepted by the Court; and Joseph M. Dericks was appointed in his stead to serve for the unexpired portion of the term.

In the matter of the petition of C. C. English, et al., for a county road at Booth's Ferry in section 25, township 35 S., R. 7 west.

The county board of road viewers was ordered to meet on Thursday, July 20th, 1911, or within five days thereafter, and survey, view and lay out said road and report to this Court thereon on or before July 26th, 1911.

The statement of S. F. Cheshire, County Clerk, in the matter of the issue of county warrants for scalp bounties for and during the month of June, 1911, examined and approved.

County Clerk was ordered to issue a county warrant in favor of School District No. 7, Josephine County, Oregon, for the purpose of maintaining the County High School for the fiscal school year of 1911-1912.

In the matter of the payment of bills, the following accounts were audited, and allowed and the Clerk of the Court directed to issue county warrants in the payment thereof:
