Mrs. M. Clemens and children left Wednesday for Newport, where they will spend some time at that favorite resort.

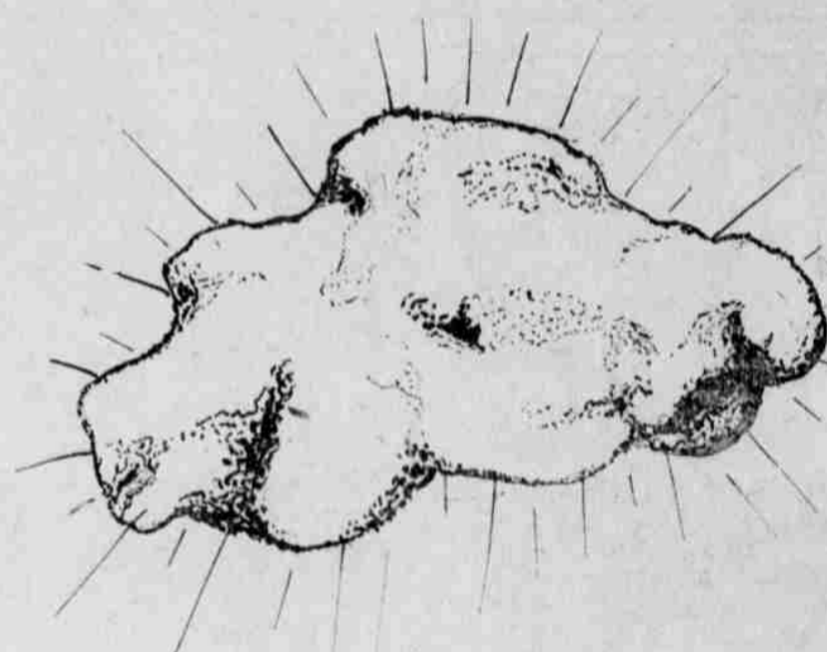
