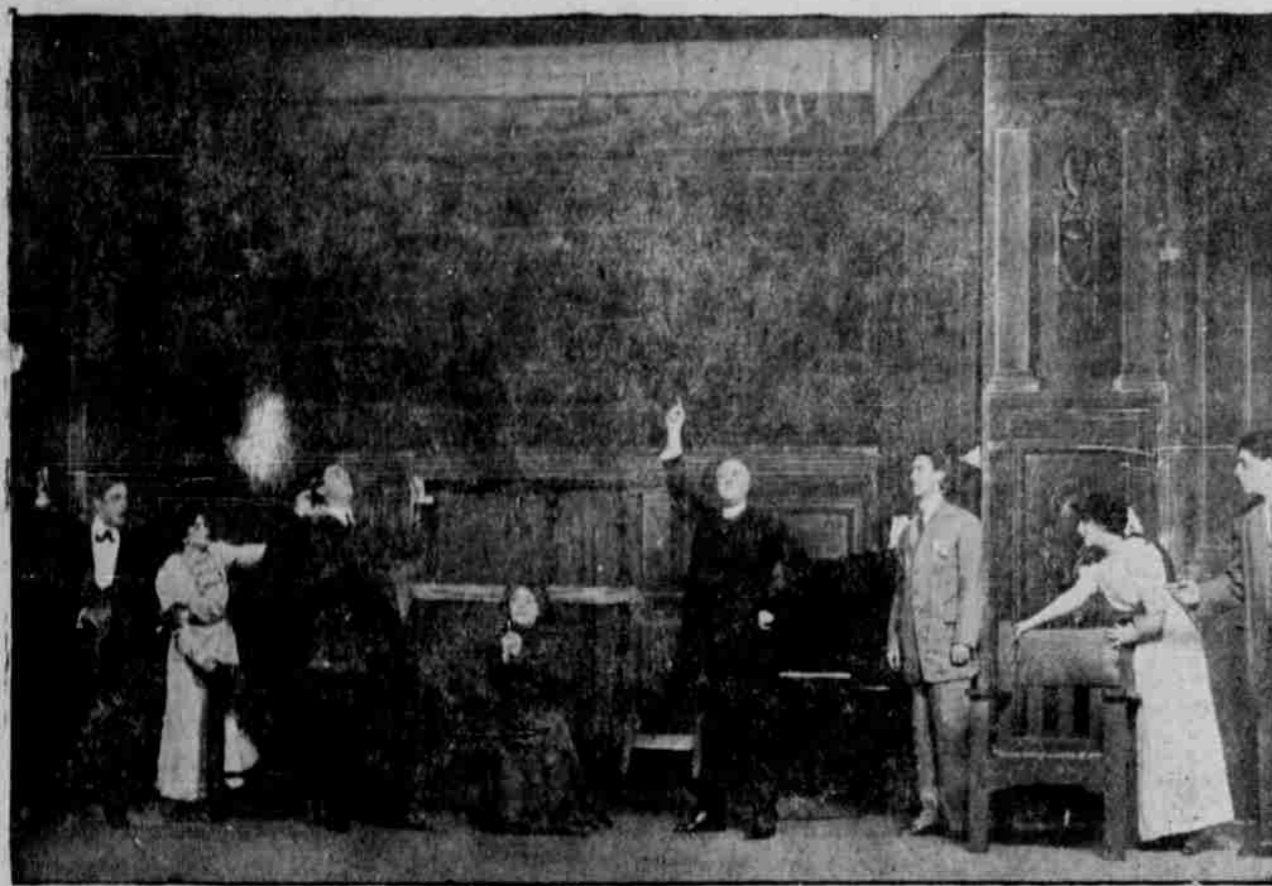

## AMUSEMENTS

Seldom does an author portray such an important character as that of a Catholic priest, and have it meet with approval from the clergy. But this is just what has happened to Edward E. Rose, author of "The Rosary," which will be seen at the Grants Pass opera house next Wednesday evening.

In "The Rosary" Mr. Rose has drawn a character of Rev. Brian Kelly, a Catholic priest, who inter-

feres in domestic troubles between man and wife, and eventually shows the unlimited amount of good that can be done by a priest, not of conventional stage character, but a real man, a big man of faith, strength and conviction. The character has been endorsed by the clergy all over the country, and it is said to be the strongest of the kind presented on the American stage.

The character will be portrayed by Harrison J. Terry, an exceptional artist, who goes through his work convincing the audience that he has mastered the author's conception of the role.

The theme of the play concerns a

man and a woman happily married. They are surrounded with every luxury of wealth and happiness. But the husband is an unbeliever, an atheist without faith of any kind. There is a jarring note in the household harmony. No one notices it until a friend of the husband comes, Father Brian Kelly, a priest of the modern world with a deep insight into human nature and a divine love for his fellowman. And when trouble comes, when the home is wrecked, and husband and wife are brought down to the depths of suffering agony, it is the priest who restores both into the sunlight of hope and love.

era art song. A number of selections from the works of Schubert were then presented, giving the audience a clearer idea of the type of Schubert's genius. The melancholy trend of the composer was well illustrated by E. S. Van Dyke, who gave a beautiful rendering of the noted song, "The Wanderer." This number was also greeted with an encore.

Prof Field gave several pianoforte selections illustrative of Schubert's instrumental work, and despite the fact that the piano in use was unsuited to such work, he gave a most beautiful interpretation of the famous "Erl King," which in the line of descriptive music has no peer in the world; the scherzo from the "Sonata" in A minor, and a transcription of the "Withered Flowers." Under the touch of the pianist, these compositions served to bring to his hearers a clearer revelation of the passion of melody that existed in the soul of the composer.

Very fittingly the program ended with the exquisite "Serenade"—the most beautiful of all love songs the

world has ever known, with its suggestion of moonlight, of flower perfumes and of heart-hunger. This was presented in the spirit of the master's intent by Miss Paddock, Miss Pattillo, E. S. Van Dyke and H. G. Marshall, and it found its way to the hearts of the audience.

Following the program there was a musical guessing game that created much amusement, and this was followed by light refreshments in the form of salad and coffee.

The meeting was marked by new additions to the membership and by larger enthusiasm for musical work in Grants Pass.

creasing some 20 per cent per year, whereas the manufacture of boxes is not increasing to that extent.

While we haven't any definite knowledge at hand, we believe that there is at least forty million feet less box lumber available for boxes at the mills this year than there was a year ago. This is in face of the fact that there was quite a large increase in the production of box lumber this year, owing to the opening up of the Weed road.

We shall be very much surprised if there is any very heavy increase in the output of lumber available that can be reached by rail in the next two years, as we cannot see where there is going to be a very large increase in the production of white pine other than out on this railroad.

There seems to be no other railroads developing now that go into a white pine territory other than this one, and white pine makes such a perfect box lumber that fruit shippers prefer it to any other material for that purpose.

While we have not ourselves traversed the country west of Grants Pass, the government reports are a sure enough indication that there is an immense forest in that locality that is available, and we are confident that the markets will absorb it as quickly as it can possibly be developed and manufactured.

We wish you success in the enterprise, as it will mean a great deal to us to be able to get our factory running full capacity, at the earliest possible time.

Kindly keep up advised of any new developments in the matter.
