CITY COUNCIL IN SPECIAL SESSION. CHANGES AGAIN. The city council, in a special session last night, rescinded its action taken at a regular session concerning city hall plans, and will not advertise for competitive plans. Instead Architect Bowen will be directed to modify the plans drawn by him, and to combine the city hall and fire station in a building to cost not to exceed \$100,000. A committee of four, Councilmen Herzinger, Clark, Everton and Stricker, was appointed to confer with the architect concerning these changes. The council advocated reducing cost by using native fir and homemade material in place of more expensive hardwood and imported brick. The resolution transferring \$5,000 received from the sale of the old city hall, to the general fund, was also rescinded. The only other business transacted at the special session was to refer the petition of the Ladies' Auxiliary back to that body with the request that they specify what amount they need per month to care for the city.

Equal Suffrage Club Met. The Equal Suffrage club was distinctly strengthened by the visit of Mrs. Jackson Silbaugh to Grants Pass, says Mrs. Pearl Bartlett, secretary of the local organization, "and her splendid lecture on 'The Problems of Our Cities and How Equal Suffrage Will Help to Solve Them.'" Many names were enlisted for the campaign in Josephine county at the meeting at the court house on Saturday afternoon. The speech told in graphic style of the awful corruption formerly existing in Seattle and of how the good women as well as the good men, spurred on by the outrageous state of affairs, the vices that were fast honeycombing not only adult society, but corrupting the young manhood and womanhood of the city, put aside the squeamishness born of precedent and worked side by side to rid the city of its filth, and now point with pride to a clean city, a great metropolis without a restricted district. Half an hour was devoted to answering questions. To the question: "What is the spirit concerning equal suffrage in the various towns you visit?" the speaker replied: "They tell me that Portland would go two to one in favor of the ballot were a vote taken there this week, and down here at Phoenix, why, the Presbyterian minister there met a Medford minister the other night in debate. Phoenix was out in a body and scores couldn't get into the hall. Phoenix people tell me they have gone wild over the Phoenix speaker's victory and the Medford debater went home a sadder and much wiser man. Oh! it's coming and you Grants Pass people may as well get into the band wagon while there's room."
