In the purchase of a hay rake the important things to look for are ease of operation and strength of rake and wheels. The wheels are too often the first parts to wear out. The McCormick self-dump rake is designed to meet these requirements, and is exceptionally durable and convenient. It is adapted for raking all conditions of hay. It is made with the same care and gives the same satisfaction that is so characteristic of the McCormick line of machines. It rakes clean, dumps quickly, and the teeth return to the ground promptly after the windrow is passed.

The illustration above shows the simple design and construction of the McCormick selfdump rake. The wheels have staggered spoke and heavy steel tires.

The teeth of the McCormick rakes are made of selected spring steel which has great strength and resiliency. The points of the teeth are shaped so that they will get all the hay without digging into the ground or picking up stones. The rake can be operated with one or two horses, simply by adjusting the shafts. The wheels are fitted with removable hubs which can easily be replaced at a small cost, thus practically renewing the wheels. This rake is designed to have the greatest strength and rigidity with the least weight. It will be found that the McCormick rake meets every requirement for gathering hay into windrows.
