NEW BRICK STRUCTURE.

The Kerley building on "J" street, just off Sixth, is nearing completion, and adds another imposing and substantial block to the many in Grants Pass.

This new structure is 50x100 feet in size, made of brick of home manufacture, the front being of beautiful pressed cement brick made by the Cement Products Co. Mr. Kerley is sparing no expense to make this building a substantial monument that will endure for many years. The foundation was laid 36 inches wide, and on this is the wall, 12 inches thick, for the first floor, 12 inches thick for the second floor, with 8-inch fire-wall. The lower floor, which will be occupied by the Counts feed store, will have cement floor and cement walks will run entirely around the building.

The second floor, rented by Messrs. E. R. Lawrence and B. F. Skillman, is being fitted up for a public hall and will be especially available for dancing parties and social events of like nature. One of the nicest dancing floors in the country will be laid. In the front part of this floor waiting and cloak rooms for ladies and gentlemen are being provided, and every convenience that modern architecture commands for public comfort will be added. A fire escape will give exit from the rear.

The building will be provided with both electric and gas light. The owner of this structure is J. E. Kerley, a pioneer resident of the city. The brick work is done by

Smith Bros., while Messrs. Smith, Slover and Nicholas are in charge of the carpenter work.

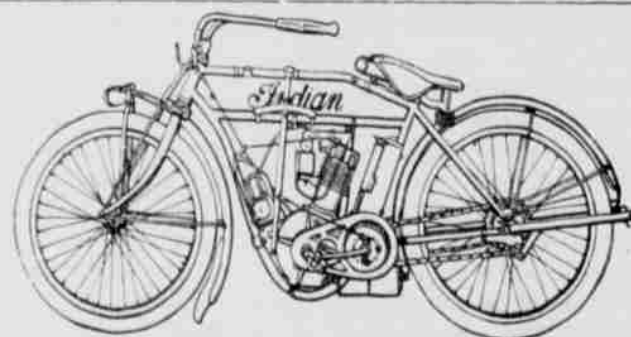
