ELECT DIRECTORS OF ALTON MINING CO.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Alton Mining company, Glen Fabrick was elected president to succeed A. K. Ware. Other officers elected were C. C. Clark, vice president; Harry Childers, secretary and treasurer. These officers, with Messrs. A. L. Bailey and W. J. Esman, are the directors. W. J. Esman, formerly chief engineer of the Midas mine in Shasta county, Cal., was elected manager and will have charge of the development work.

The property of the Alton company consists of four claims located near the Greenback mine, on the north slope of St. Peter mountain. It is a free milling proposition, and a hundred assays are said to have returned values of an average of about \$1.00 per ton. A boiler and compressor are to be installed, and development will be pressed. There are eight leads on this property, from one to five feet in width, and a 500-foot tunnel will cross cut at a depth of from 400 to 600 feet. Four hundred feet of tunnel work has already been done.

LOGANBERRY TO FIGURE IN VALLEY'S PROSPERITY.

The loganberry as a producer of revenue is just now attracting much attention in the state of Oregon, and the fact that no part of the state can produce the luscious fruit in better perfection or greater quantity than the Rogue river valley has occasioned an agitation here to have a larger acreage of the berries planted. A branch of the industry that would appeal especially to this vicinity is the drying of the fruit, as in that form it has a ready market, with no hazard of shipment, and with transportation reduced to a minimum.

In the Willamette valley hundreds of acres of the berries are being planted out, and the returns from them is quoted in figures that run into the hundreds. Geo. H. Parker, the local nurseryman, has been investigating the culture of the berry, and supplies the Courier with the following letter which he has received from a Salem wholesale house regarding the outlook for the berry in its evaporated form:

"It is true that we have been interested in the growing of loganberries for evaporating purposes, and while there may not be many dried during the next few years we believe the time is coming when this will be an industry of considerable importance. Just now the supply available for the canners is not sufficient to meet their demands. It is only within the last few years that the canners have learned the art of preparing them properly in tin. The demand also on the part of the consumer has been growing very rapidly during the past three or four years so that there is now a specific demand for loganberries in many forms.

"We can see a great future for this product dried, especially in localities where there may be land well suited to its production which is located back too remote from rail facilities or from canneries, and where they can be easily dried and thus hauled out in condensed form. We would be willing to give a contract covering a term of five or seven years on a goodly acreage of loganberries, the same to be evaporated and delivered to us as soon as cured every season. The tonnage produced per acre on land which is well located and well adapted to the culture of loganberries is enormous and will pay handsomely.

THEEVES GET BIG HAUL AT THE DAM

A diamond stud valued at \$240, seven gold nuggets worth from sixty cents to \$5 each, a gold ring and two breast pins were valuables that Mr. and Mrs. B. T. Bristol kept under the bed at their home at the Ament dam, where Mr. Bristol has charge of the pumps for the irrigation company. Thursday the diamond and the other articles disappeared, and the Bristol thought that suspicion pointed strongly enough in a certain direction to warrant the making of complaint and the obtaining of a search warrant. When the suspected premises were searched, however, the officers were

unable to locate any of the articles enumerated, although a hat pin, valued at little more than a dollar, the property of Mrs. Bristol, was found, and this the suspected party acknowledged taking, but strenuously denied all knowledge of the more valuable articles.

No arrests followed and there is no evidence to indicate how the diamond and the nuggets disappeared, or the direction they took when they departed from under the bed.
