THE SCIENCE OF HUMAN BREEDING.

It is generally believed that the International Eugenics congress, which is to take place in London in the near future, will inaugurate a new era in human welfare.

The papers to be delivered are divided into three classes—eugenics in relation to biology, eugenics in relation to sociology and history, and the practical application of eugenic principles.

Although Britain will be represented by Sir William Osler and France and Germany by some of their foremost scientists, a large and important section of the programme is occupied by the papers to be read by American professors.

Dr. Raymond Pearl, director of the Maine Agricultural Station, enlightened the congress on the subject

of "The Inheritance of Fecundity," and Dr. David P. Weeks, superintendent of the New Jersey State Village of Epileptics, on "The Inheritance of Epilepsy."

The meetings of the congress are to be held at the University of London, South Kensington, where there will also be an exhibition.

ABOUT NATIONAL CONVENTIONS.

The June national conventions this year have been and still are of the very highest importance to the people of the entire country.

Historically considered the Chicago convention outranks all others as far as dissensions among the delegates are concerned.

In the line of history, let us go back to that other year, that is 1860, which resulted in the baptism and victory of the republican party.

In the republican party the convention of 1880 holds the record, in that convention 36 ballots were taken before Garfield was nominated.
