PARTY RETURNS FROM TRIP OF EXPERIENCES.
The party of four consisting of Messrs. Donnell, Counts, Williams and Anderson, who returned Wednesday from a 225 mile trip through Curry, Coos and Douglas counties, making 150 miles on foot, do not entirely agree as to minor incidents of the jaunt; but their tales of big strings of fish and sore feet have a true ring; in fact Williams walks yet as if afraid of bruising the pavement.
The Courier by interviews, threats and confessions has managed to get the following out of the members of the party: The stolen dog referred to in our columns was traded to Mr. Francis at Horseshoe Bend for supper and breakfast for the party; so they really ate the dog early on the trip.
Horseshoe Bend is the sharpest curve on Rogue river, as the river doubles around a rock point so a tunnel 400 feet in length will drain over half a mile of river bed and give 31 feet fall at the lower end; this narrow neck is being tunneled by Cottage Grove people with the intention of mining the bed of the stream and later developing power from the tunnel. The mining industry is unusually brisk in this locality and around Mule creek; much money is being spent in ditches and flumes to work three river bars long known to be rich in gold. Mr. Francis and Dr. W. A. Wise, of Portland, have constructed a long bridge across the river above the horseshoe bend for the purpose of bringing a flume across and more profitably working their places on the north side. At Blossom Bar, just below Mule Creek, a company is erecting a quartz mill and cable tramway to develop what they consider a valuable quartz property. All these mining operations give employment to a considerable number of men, and all machinery and supplies come in from the north, though the trade of this region belongs to Grants Pass and should come up the river, and a mail route established this way would soon bring this trade here. The only obstacle to such a mail route is what is known as the "Zig Zag" near Bunker Creek, and it is estimated that \$1,100.00 would construct a trail around this obstruction. The government has spent many thousands of dollars in making the trail down Rogue river, and Josephine county has also \$1,000 already invested in it, so it is to be regretted that the lack of so small an amount should prevent the completion of so important a highway. It is understood that if this county will donate one-half the cost the forest service will complete the trail; if this is true the donation should be made at once. Everybody along the river is anxious to have the work done as only by this route can an open trail be secured during the winter months.
The party left the Rogue at Mule Creek and crossed the Devils Backbone into the Coquille valley along one of the railroad surveys now being run from the coast. Right on top of this craggy ridge, 500 feet above any level piece of land large enough for a baseball diamond, a tragedy was narrowly avoided, three of the party organized a court, tried Anderson, who had piloted them to the spot, for saying it was "fair hiking" over the mountain, and prepared to hang him forthwith; but like our illustrious governor they later committed his sentence to cooking bread for the crowd during the rest of the trip, and are now sorry for their leniency as Donnell and Counts lost 20 pounds each in weight, while Williams is continually followed by stray dogs that appear to take him for a bone, all claiming that it was the bread that did it.
There are several survey crews running railroad lines from the coast to Marshfield and Bandon through the great forests and coal fields on the head of the south fork of the Coquille to Grants Pass; but excepting that there is a keen rivalry to find the best route in the quickest time little can be learned. All seem anxious to cross the divide high enough to keep out of the canyon of the river below Galice, yet low enough to control the tonnage which that camp will furnish in the way of ores and copper matte. Just how many of these proposed lines are simply promotion schemes it is impossible to tell; but the completion of either would make Grants Pass the manufacturing center of Southern Oregon by supplying it with an abundance of cheap coal and fine lumber for its factories.
The last day's tramp is said to have been an endurance race of 23 miles carrying packs over a very

rough mountain trail to Westfork, with Williams backing himself against the field. Like the old fable of the "Hare and the Tortoise," he made the 30 miles in record time; but on the last three miles the old boy got his goat and it took a strenuous salt rubbing to get the kinks out of his muscles so he could get 50 cents worth of comfort out of his bed at the Westfork hotel.
