STATE LAND BOARD GIVES LONG LEASE. SALEM, Or., Aug. 15.—The state land board has given a forty-year lease to a company represented by Charles M. Sain, Ellis Mallory and W. G. Young of Los Angeles, covering the waters and beds of Summer and Albert Lakes in southeastern Oregon, comprising about 88,000 acres of land and water. The company is to commence the immediate construction of dams and reclaiming plants of sufficient capacity to evaporate not less than 100,000 tons of salt annually at each lake.
