ROOSEVELT INTERRUPTED BY RUNAWAY HORSE.

ST. PAUL, Sept. 5.—Just as Colonel Roosevelt began speaking at the fair grounds in Hamline, near here, today, a runaway horse plunged into the crowd about the stand. Seven persons were injured and were taken to the hospital. Thirty others were knocked down and suffered lesser injuries.

More than 30 men, women and children were trampled by the maddened horse within a few feet of where Colonel Roosevelt was speaking. Roosevelt seemed unmoved by the tumult and continued his address in an effort to reassure the throng. The horse stopped plunging when the crowd became so dense that it could not proceed further, and was dragged down by a dozen hands. None of the injured are expected to die.

WATKINS NOW KNOWS HE IS IN THE RACE.

ADA, Ohio, Sept. 5.—Aaron S. Watkins was notified here today of his nomination on the prohibition ticket for vice-president of the United States.

In his speech of acceptance he criticized Woodrow Wilson, President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt.

NO STRIKE BY CARMEN.

CHICAGO, Sept. 5.—All possibility of a street car men's strike here is believed today to have been eliminated by the action of President Roach of the City Railway company in agreeing to the demands of the men for arbitration of the existing differences. Roach announced that the arbitration board would settle the differences between the company and the union, and the company would abide by the result.
