GOVERNORS VINDICATED.

Cincinnati, June 10.—Former Governor Judson Harmon today declared that the United States supreme court's decision in the Minnesota rate cases is a complete vindication of the position taken by the governor's convention. Harmon, Hadley and former Governor Aldrich of Nebraska prepared the governors' brief which was presented to the court.

LIGHTNING KILLS IN EASTERN WASHINGTON.

Spokane, June 10.—Leaving fifteen children motherless Mrs. Bert Howell, wife of a farmer near Pullman, is dead here today as the result of being struck by lightning. She received the shock during a severe electrical storm.

ARREST MEXICAN AS ACCOMPLICE OF JUAN SOTO.

Los Angeles, June 10.—Charged with being an accomplice in a triple murder by Juan Soto, who stabbed to death two girls and a man in the Mexican quarter here a week ago, Jose Vujara is in jail here today. It is alleged that he was Soto's companion when the murders were committed. The police have failed to find any trace of Soto, although it is persistently reported that he has not left Los Angeles.

STATE SUPREME COURT HANDS DOWN DECISIONS.

Salem, June 10.—The supreme court today handed down a decision holding that the election creating the Port of Bay Ocean Tillamook county is void. The election was contested on the grounds of insufficiency of election notices, which the court held did not properly describe the exterior boundaries of the proposed port.

The court also dismissed the appeal of Robert Morgan, under sentence to be hanged for the murder committed in Gilliam county, holding that the transcript in the case had not been filed within the statutory limit.

SUFFRAGETTE 'FESSES TO SAVE INNOCENT MAN.

Doncaster, England, June 10.—Because an innocent man was charged with the crime, Lillian Lenson, a suffragette "arsonette," surrendered to the police today and confessed to burning Westfield House, which was recently destroyed here in a mysterious fire.

HUMANE SOCIETY GETS BABE DESERTED BY GIRL.

Los Angeles, June 10.—"Please some one provide for him; I cannot." This was the text of a penciled note pinned to the dress of a tiny week-old baby that a girl dropped in the lap of Mrs. M. G. Gonzales in the rest room of a department store here. The girl disappeared before the woman recovered from her surprise. The baby was given in charge of humane officers.

WILD SCENES IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

London, June 11.—The wildest scenes in a decade were enacted in the house of commons here today. The crest of the demonstration was reached when a male suffragette sympathizer hurled a sack of flour at Premier Asquith from the visitors' gallery. It narrowly missed the premier, who was speaking when the sack struck the floor at his feet. It burst, a cloud of flour almost smothering the cabinet officers, who occupied seats on the ministerial benches. Later the same man threw suffragette pamphlets at members of parliament, shouting incoherently regarding Miss Emily Davison who died a few days ago from injuries received on Derby day, when she flung herself at King George's entry in the great race, putting the horse out of the running. The man was arrested.

"ALL MEN RUBBERNECKS" SAYS OAKLAND CHIEF.

Washington, June 11.—"All men are rubbernecks," was the variation from the scriptural saw sprung by Chief of Police Peterson of Oakland, Cal., here today at the chief of police's conference, when the style of women's dress and the way to stamp out turkey trotting came up. "Any normal man," said Peterson, "would look around and rubber when he saw women wearing dresses chopped off at the ankles and the neck, split up to the knees and fitting like a glove."

AUTHORITIES CATCH THE OPIUM QUEEN.

San Francisco, June 11.—The "Opium Queen" of Chinatown, Mrs. Wong Ten, tried to "put one over" on the customs authorities here today in a novel way—but she failed to get away with it and is under \$2,000 bonds for action by the federal grand jury. Mrs. You was captured on the Pacific Mail dock when her trousers bulged. Investigation showed the bumps were five tins of opium, and Mrs. You was "pinched."

STEAMER OLINDA SAFE.

New York, June 9.—Wireless dispatches received here at noon from the Cuban steamer Olinda, which was reported on fire at sea earlier in the day, stated that all was well and that the vessel lay 525 miles south of Scotland Lightship. It is believed the Olinda is enroute either to Brunswick or Savannah, Ga.

GIRLS GET LIQUOR AT DEL REY TAVERN.

Los Angeles, June 9.—Eight girls whose ages range from 14 to 18, and seven men are under arrest today following a sensational raid on Del Rey Tavern, near Venice. The names of the girls have been suppressed by the police, but, according to the officers, one was captured after she had leaped through a window, while another, who threatened to commit suicide, is being closely guarded.

The raid, which was made in connection with the anti-vice campaign instituted here, came while, it is alleged, drinking and "ragging" at the tavern were at their height. The officers claim that liquor was served without question to girls barely in their teens.

BAD NEWS OF HUSBAND KILLS PORTLAND WOMAN.

Portland, June 9.—Mrs. W. H. Smith, aged 64, is dead here today from an attack of heart disease brought on by the news that her husband had fallen to the pavement and broken his hip. When told of the accident Mrs. Smith collapsed and could not be revived. Mrs. Smith leaves two sons and two daughters, among them being Mrs. Edith Brinkerhoff of Seattle.

NATIONAL BANKS MUST MAKE REPORT OF CONDITION.

Washington, June 9.—A call for the condition of all national banks at the close of business June 4, was issued today by the comptroller of the currency.

ENGLISH AND AMERICAN POLO TEAMS WELL MATCHED.

New York, June 9.—It is even money here today on English and American chances in the international polo games. Backers of the English team offered odds of eight to five against the Keene team, but think the Whitney-Milburn-Waterbury combination better and will not lay better than even money against them.

RAIN WRECKERS RESPONSIBLE FOR DERAILMENT ON S. P.

Salem, June 9.—The state railroad commission, after a thorough investigation, today reported that the wreck of the Southern Pacific northbound train near Salem Saturday was evidently the work of trainwreckers. This confirms the report of the Southern Pacific board of inquiry. Southern Pacific officials have offered a reward of \$5,000 for the arrest and conviction of the alleged train wreckers.

ALLEGED LOBBYIST APPEARS BEFORE THE COMMITTEE.

Washington, June 9.—The first alleged lobbyist to appear before the senate sub-committee investigating President Wilson's "insidious lobby" charge testified here this afternoon. The witness was Former Senator Faulkner of West Virginia. He admitted that 12 years after leaving the senate he had represented a number of railroads and commercial companies here by appearing before congressional committees.

GRAND VIZIER OF TURKEY IS KILLED.

Constantinople, June 11.—Serious outbreaks and desperate street fighting between the various Turkish factions are threatened here tonight as a result of the assassination today of Mahmoud Shekret Pasha and Ibrahim Bey, the grand vizier of Turkey and his aide de camp. No trace of the assassins has yet been found, but as there is little doubt that they were emissaries of the faction opposed politically to the grand vizier, his party is expected bloody vengeance.

Martial law was proclaimed this evening and every possible force of the government is being strained to prevent outbreaks which might culminate in a revolution.

London, June 11.—Advices from Constantinople received here this afternoon state that Shekret Bey, grand vizier of Turkey, was assassinated near the Turkish capital this morning.

Later advices confirmed the assassination. Shekret Pasha was killed as he motored to the Sublime Porte, and his companion, Ibrahim Bey, was also slain. With two servants accompanying them on horseback, Shekret and his friend were proceeding at a moderate speed when they were met by another motor. As the strange automobile approached a perfect fusillade of bullets rained into Shekret's machine. The grand vizier, pierced in a score of places, fell dead instantly. Ibrahim Bey was hit by only one bullet. He died within a few minutes.

SERB-BULGAR WAR NOW SEEMS LIKELY.

Belgrade, June 10.—"Serbia and Bulgaria are bound to fight," said Minister of War Boyovitch here today, "unless the powers can induce Bulgaria to consent to a revision of the Serbo-Bulgarian treaty. In any event, the Turkish territory Serbia now holds must remain Serbian. If Bulgaria objects to this war will follow."

That Russia believes a Serb-Bulgar war is certain was indicated today when Russia recalled all officers of that nation serving with the Serbian and Bulgarian armies. The officers were loaned to the Balkan states as instructors. Their recall indicates that Russia intends to remain neutral in the impending struggle unless some other state takes sides.

MEDITERRANEAN TO SEE GREAT U. S. FLEET.

Washington, June 11.—Within a short time the United States will step in and wrest the naval supremacy of the Mediterranean Sea from European powers which have been contesting for it for years. It will be a bloodless, flightless invasion. When the eight dreadnaughts, thirteen pre-dreadnaughts and other naval craft flying the stars and stripes sail past Gibraltar for their cruise in Mediterranean waters, the fleets of France, Italy, Austria and Great Britain will be overshadowed by the monies, and for the time being the United States will be supreme in those waters. A tentative itinerary of the fleet, announced at the navy department today arranges for a stop at almost every Mediterranean port where formal welcome by the respective authorities awaits the Yankee officers and sailors.
