LAUNCHING OF PALATIAL YACHT CYPRUS TODAY.

Seattle, Sept. 24.—The Cyprus, a pleasure yacht, recommended to be the finest on the Pacific coast with a length of 231 feet and a beam of 30 feet will be launched here this afternoon from the yards of the Seattle Construction company. The vessel is being built for Col. D. C. Jackling, mining man of Salt Lake City and will cost \$500,000.

TWO SCHOONERS ARE POSTED AS MISSING.

Portland, Sept. 24.—That the fate of the 21 men who went to sea from Astoria this spring on the American schooners El Dorado and Americana, will always remain a mystery was the belief of shipping men here today, following the posting of two vessels as "missing" by Lloyd's Register.

Since the vessels left port no word has been heard of them. The Americana sailed from Astoria March 3 for Antofogasta and the El Dorado sailed for Australia April 1. Both were lumber laden, each carrying about 1,000,000 feet.

WILSON CANDIDATE WINS N. J. ELECTION.

Trenton, N. J., Sept. 24.—President Woodrow Wilson's candidate for the democratic nomination as governor of New Jersey was victorious, as shown by complete returns today from yesterday's state primaries. The three nominations were as follows:

Democratic—Felder; republican—Stokes; progressive—Colby.

The Wilson democrats won not only on the gubernatorial nomination but on their choice of a legislative ticket and in the state committee contest.

The progressives cast the smallest vote at the primaries, which Candidate Stokes declared to mean that numerous progressives have returned to the republican fold. On the strength of this, he predicted a republican victory at the election.

SUPREME COURT DECIDES AGAINST MRS TAYLOR.

Salem, Sept. 24.—The state supreme court has today rendered a decision holding that Mrs. Charles D. Taylor is not entitled to suit or maintenance money during the pendency of her appeal from a decision in the Clackamas county court declaring void her marriage to Charles D. Taylor, millionaire mining man of San Francisco. The marriage was declared void several years ago, but Mrs. Taylor appealed on the grounds that she had not been advised of the action.

Taylor moved that the appeal be dismissed, which was done, but the Clackamas county court awarded Mrs. Taylor \$2,000 suit money and \$8,665 for maintenance while the appeal was pending. Taylor took the matter to the supreme court.

ITALIAN GIRL RESCUES AGED MOTHER FROM FIRE.

San Francisco, Sept. 24.—Miss Orchetti De Nattel, a pretty Italian girl, proved the heroine of a \$10,000 fire here today, when she carried her aged mother, Mrs. G. B. DeNattel, from their blazing home. The older woman was overcome by smoke while asleep, and but for the courage of her daughter probably would have succumbed.

SAN FRANCISCO EARTHQUAKE SAVED MAN'S NECK.

Sacramento, Sept. 23.—The defendant has lost his right of appeal through an act of God. Therefore I commute his sentence to life imprisonment.

This paragraph, written by Governor Johnson, prevents August Gerber, convicted in 1905 of murder, in San Francisco, from going to the gallows.

While Gerber's case was under appeal in the supreme court the records were destroyed by the earthquake and fire in 1906. The commutation of sentence today resulted.

LAD ESCAPES IN FALL OF 97 FEET.

Seattle, Sept. 24.—The miraculous escape of Thomas Ketchel, aged 7, with hardly a scratch after falling 97 feet to the bottom of an abandoned well, is subject of comment among local physicians today. The boy was crossing a vacant lot and another boy, approaching him from an opposite direction, saw him suddenly disappear. Rotted planks covering the well had broken under the boy's weight. Police were called and the boy was rescued without a scratch but somewhat dazed.

Seattle, Sept. 24.—Federal officials Monday night seized 625 cases of condensed milk on the steamer Shidzuoka Maru, which sails from Seattle for Shanghai today. It is alleged the pure food law was violated in that the cans were labeled "Condensed cream."

AVIATOR CAVALIER IS FATALLY INJURED.

Rheims, France, Sept. 24.—Aviator Cavalier was fatally injured today while flying in a monoplane from Juvisy to Rheims to participate in the Bennett cup competition here Friday. He fell from an altitude of 75 feet. His skull was fractured.
