SAYS CANADA ARRANGED REFUGE FOR GEN. DIAZ
Vera Cruz, Oct. 29.—The proprietor of the German Hotel, where Diaz was a guest before taking refuge in the United States consulate, summoned before the local authorities to give the details of his relations with the fugitive, swore that American Consul Canada made all the arrangements for the general to live at the hotel on leaving the home of his brother-in-law, Rafael Alecolea.
The hotel man added mournfully that Diaz and his two companions left the hostelry \$1,000 in debt for their entertainment there. Alecolea, it was learned only last night, has been a fugitive since Sunday. He has been charged with flourishing a pistol at one of the polling booths on election day, but was released later on bond and took refuge with German Consul Gerz, who was still sheltering him today. It was believed he would be put on board the Kaiser's cruiser Hertha and landed at some neutral port.
GRAND JURY PROBES SLINGSBY BABY CASE
San Francisco, Oct. 28.—Mrs. Hattie Blaine, much wanted as a witness before the grand jury in connection with the famous Slingsby baby case, was found at her home today by a subpoena server for District Attorney Fickert and promised to appear before the inquisitors this evening.
Detectives had watched Mrs. Blaine's house all night, making repeated efforts to get in, but without the slightest response. By a terrific assault on the door they finally brought Mrs. Blaine, however, and at once arrested her for disregarding the grand jury subpoena. On promising to appear, she was later released on her recognizance.
