Former Missionary Visits in the Valley

Mr. and Mrs. Fred A. McCarl and their son Adrian from Los Angeles, California, were guests of Mrs. William A. Brown for dinner at the Waldo Auto Court, O'Brien, August 18. Mr. McCarl was the head of the Army and Navy Department of the International Committee of the Young Men's Christian Association from 1905 to 1935. He did notable service for the allied armies during the World War. He originated the idea of "The Hut" as a center for welfare work among the uniformed men of the nation. He is widely known as the intimate lay counselor of the Secretaries of War and Navy in the President's Cabinet, and as the special friend of the high commanding officers of both branches of the service concerning all phases of welfare work for the soldiers and sailors. The splendid Y. M. C. A. buildings for the uniformed men in the port cities of America, at Honolulu, and in Manila, and elsewhere were erected under his supervision. He and the McCarls and the Browns were fellow missionaries of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the early days of the American occupation of the Philippines, Mr. McCarl being director of the Mission Press, while Dr. Brown was pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church, the union church in which people of the many faiths all worshipped together. The McCarls called at this time to speak particularly about the Friendly Mission which Dr. and Mrs. Brown are planning to create in the shelter of the Siskiyou.

MISSING MAN IS FOUND IN FENCE

A search of three weeks for Alvin L. Drake, 76, resident of the Jackson county poor farm, was ended at 5:45 yesterday morning when his lifeless body was discovered entangled in a barbed wire fence about one-half mile from his former home and about 32 feet from the Southern Pacific railroad tracks.

The aged man, who had disappeared from the county farm between 5 and 6 a. m. August 9th, apparently died from heart failure or shock in attempting to climb the barbed wire fence, the county coroner's office said. The body, badly composed, was removed to Kerby yesterday for burial.

Discovery was made by Cecil Hartley, a resident of that section, while he was letting water into his irrigation ditch. The body was badly tangled in the barbed wire fence. Weeds at least five feet high almost completely hid the body from the Southern Pacific tracks, accounting for the belated discovery, according to the coroner's office.

Although the body was so badly decomposed that a minute examination was impossible, it was discovered that one arm was broken, probably caused when Drake half fell while attempting to climb the fence. The old fellow had removed his shoes and socks.

Drake left the county farm after residing there just one week to the day. To reach the railroad right of way, he was forced to cross a larder corn and alfalfa field. No reason was given for his disappearance, after which a search was made but to no avail.

Drake leaves one brother, Ira K. Drake of Gold Hill, and other relatives in California. He will be buried in Kerby, where he formerly lived for some time.
