Getting ready for the big Jubilee, where it will be demonstrating what it can do for the miners, the smelter of the Precious Metals Recovery & Smelting Co., Inc., of Seattle, Washington, will be up and ready for operation during the Jubilee.

W. F. Carff and Mr. McBride of the company are on the ground and have prepared the exhibition space near the Sailor's Diggins, where the smelter will be on display and operating during the Jubilee. We wish to call special attention to all those visiting the smelter. Do NOT touch the smelter while hot for operation nor the sand that comes from it. You will get burned very badly if you do. DO NOT TOUCH.

They still need more concentrates to make a proper demonstration. If you have any, bring it in. If anyone desires information before Saturday, see either of the above mentioned gentlemen, and they will be glad to answer all questions.

There will be an assayer here with the smelter and he will be operating just as soon as he can get set up. Assays will be free to those furnishing concentrates during the Jubilee.

Large operators—If you are interested in the development of this district, you should see this smelter and find out what it will do with your particular kind of concentrates and ore. The company does not guarantee a cure-all for minerals, but they will tell you what they can and cannot do, and won't make any promises they can't deliver. They can handle most of the ore and concentrates in this district, but they may run up against something that might take some time to work, but if this is the case, you can bank on complete cooperation by these men.
