## MAKING FRIENDS

A fine demonstration of neighborly friendship was produced in Portland at the railroad meeting last week. Grants Pass, that friendly, neighborly city on the Rogue river, won the blue ribbon and without any competition took the sweepstakes prize for being just what she is, the cleanest, friendliest city in Oregon.

When prominent people of all walks of life come to a meeting from San Francisco and other northern points of California; from all over Southern Oregon, and pay their own expenses, just to testify before the Interstate Commerce commission in the interests of any city—such a demonstration is a sure sign that the city in question is well qualified and worthy of all the interest the people took in her behalf, otherwise they would have stayed home.

Grants Pass has made friends of all the other Southern Oregon cities and is the northern terminus of the Redwood highway, and all the cities on this famous highway are exceedingly friendly to Grants Pass, because the Oregon city has put herself out of the way to be neighborly and friendly to all.

Grants Pass is justly deserving of the splendid support she received at the above mentioned meeting, and if the request for the privilege of building a railroad to Crescent City is not granted, it will not be the fault of those live wires from all over the coast, who have spread the cards on the table, face up, for the benefit of the development of the last frontier of Oregon and Northern California, who purposely came to bat for the most beloved city in Oregon, Grants Pass.

## DRAINAGE NEEDED

The main highway through Cave Junction belongs to the state highway system and will have to be taken care of by the commission if anything is done to keep the city from being flooded this fall and winter.

Wherever it is necessary to protect the highway, the commission builds culverts and lays tiling along the highway to drain water from the road. It is going to be an important question with the city this winter to see that something is done along this line to keep the highway open for traf-

fic. Last winter and spring puddles of water nearly covered the highway and lakes settled on both sides of the street for a long time.

This condition must not prevail this winter. It would take very little work for the highway commission to construct a drain on both sides of the street, if the work is done now. This matter should be brought to the attention of the highway commission immediately as action is needed now.

## Oregon Traffic Deaths

A Series of Weekly Articles on the Problem of Highway Safety By Earl Snell, Secretary of State.

"Slow Down at Sundown" is advice that can well be heeded by the careful driver. The nation's record of after dark driving is a warning to all motor vehicle operators.

Throughout the nation it is estimated that about 20 per cent of the travel is at night. Yet three fifths of the fatal accidents occur during the hours of darkness.

As the density of traffic decreases, speeds generally increase. One out of every forty-five day time injuries results in death, as compared with one out of every twenty eight injured in night traffic accidents.

Carefully compiled data from seven states also shows that the six hours of darkness before midnight account for a total of 52 per cent of the fatal pedestrian accidents.

Again we are at the time of year when driving becomes the most difficult, and the ordinary hazards of traffic will be increased by wet and slippery pavements, fog, and other handicaps incidental to winter driving. Night driving in particular requires additional care and caution in unfavorable weather. Wet pavement and glaring headlights constitute a deadly combination, particularly at dusk, and all of these elements must be considered in motor vehicle operation for the next few months.

Give careful consideration to all conditions under which you are driving, and regulate the speed of your car accordingly. Help eliminate Oregon's traffic deaths.
