while in Ashland at the Siskiyou dedication, he and Mr. Athey had contacted Mr. Cabell chairman of the state highway who promised to look into the matter of providing drainage for the highway through Cave City.

Many encouraging reports were coming in on the extension of the electric line to O'Brien, Dr. Brown told the members.

The meeting was then taken over by the discussion of the water conservation idea. Roy Wells was the first speaker and he thought that all the farmers who have perpetual water rights would be interested if they were assured that their rights would not be involved.

Bob Walton said the old settlers with water rights would have to be protected, and if this was done, and water conserved, he believed many additional acres could be put into cultivation. He said he could use more water if it was available.

Mr. Hussey interposed here, that the state engineer cooperating with the federal government would now make a survey of the valley if we made a strong appeal for the help right now, as the water conservation situation was being discussed and surveyed in other parts of the county at this time.

Roy Wells introduced Mr. Payne and Clarence Sawyer who voiced their approval of water conservation, if the settlers were protected. Mr. Tyler was also of the same opinion.

Clarence Sawyer hit the keynote of all discussion when he said, "The Illinois Valley is as far along as it can go now, without more water." He said anything that could be done to get more water without interfering with the present water rights, was the most desirable action that could be taken to develop the valley. Many others were in favor of the project of more irrigation when and if the water was available.

G. A. Peterson gave a mountain of light when he explained that the proposed railroad, when their survey was made, had selected three sites for dams and stated that the survey showed that 55,000 acres could be irrigated in the valley. There are now approximately 13,000 acres under irrigation. Mr. Peterson said that the survey showed there was enough water for everyone and to spare if conserved and stored for use. He has maps and data on this subject that will be valuable to those working on the subject.

A committee of three, Clarence Sawyer, Roy Wells and Bob Walton was appointed to prepare a resolution from the farmers, asking the Chamber of Commerce to help get a survey from the federal government at the present time.

Under new business, William A. Brown gave a fine talk concerning new enterprises, asking for a committee composed of a farmer, a miner, a business man and others to contact those who were thinking of starting some business and help get new industries started here. He said that to bring people in the valley without anything to do was the wrong idea. Get new industries and give them a job or put them on good land, was his suggestion. He asked that a committee of five be appointed to be known as New Business Enterprises committee. The motion was passed.

C. L. Schmacher asked to have all those who wished to contribute to a floral piece for the funeral of our departed sheriff, Ernest Lister, from his friends in the valley to do so at his store, where a box was placed for that purpose. A motion was unanimously carried to have the secretary write a letter of sympathy to his widow and family.

Fred Delano said he had presented a petition signed by prospective users of electricity on the Caves highway to the COPCO company, stating that the company was very glad to receive it.

The meeting was adjourned, but several stayed for a long time discussing proposed improvements in the valley and the possibilities for future development. The meeting was indeed successful and enjoyed.

Harry Ecker arrived last Saturday morning to take charge of the gas and oil station of the Camp-U-Rest. Mr. Ecker states that many improvements will be made in the near future, putting in a greasing department and will specialize in high pressure lubrication.
