WHY IT IS CALLED VICTORY LUNCHEON

All announcements of the December 15th celebration of the 80th Anniversary Jubilee over the blazing of the trail over the mountains which opened a final highway from the Illinois Valley to the sea tell of the VICTORY LUNCHEON to be given in the Grange hall at Bridgeview.

The Illinois Valley News is glad to print the letter which was read at the Chamber of Commerce days ago and which because of the supreme importance of the news it contains and the high character of the enterprise and the value of it to the entire valley merits a more permanent record and wider publicity.

The letter is as follows:

Salem, Oregon,
November 12, 1937.

Gentlemen:

Under date of November 10, Mr. J. C. Boyle, vice president in charge of operations of The California Oregon Power company, divides the Honorable N. G. Wallace, Commissioner, as follows:

"As a matter of record and to complete your file, Mr. Brewer now reports that the original eighteen customers have signed applications for service, and in addition we have a five-year contract with one customer for 20 h. p. at O'Brien. This increases the revenue to a point where the extension may now be built without an advance by the customer and still be within the Oregon Extension Policy."

The Commissioner has directed me to extend to you and to the community his congratulations, along with my own, for the public spiritedness that has made this possible.

It has been our contention for the past two years that our present Oregon Line Extension Policy is one of the most liberal in the Nation, and this seems to be but one of the many instances in which this claim has been substantiated.

This writer knows from conversations with both of them, that both Mr. Boyle and Mr. Brewer have done everything within their power to work out this problem so that the extension might be built without guarantees of prepaid revenue.

The construction of this extension shows what can be accomplished when earnest and fair-minded men approach a problem of this character in the spirit of fairness and mutual cooperation.
