It was seconded by Fred Galeno and carried.

Dr. Brown was asked to report on the new metropolitan area. He said the area should be bounded on the north by or near the Johns home north of Kerby, on the south by the Brown home, on the east by the Oregon Caves and on the west by the Smith residence.

Mr. McLean suggested that Kerby and Cave City should get together on a water system. Dr. Brown suggested a basket ball game between the women of the two towns as well as the men. He also suggested as a slogan for the metropolitan area, "We Build Together." Moved by Mr. McLean and seconded by Mr. Balzke the slogan was adopted unanimously.

Mr. McLean asked the Chamber to ask the Forest Service for new maps so the metropolitan district could be marked out. He also moved that the Chamber get out a booklet advertising the Valley. The motion was seconded by Mr. Balzke and it was carried.

Mr. Michener was called upon for a few remarks. He responded with a sales talk which was received with laughter and applause. Meeting adjourned until next Tuesday noon, January 25th.

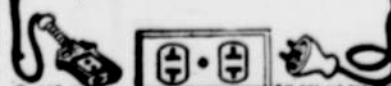

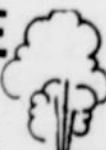
