Nickel is a reasonable mineral to expect in the highly basic rocks, peridotite, dunite and serpentine especially along their contacts with the less basic or acid granitic formations, or perhaps where a granitic dyke passes through them.

In Josephine creek there occurs a unique mineral known as Josephinite. It is a combination of nickel, iron, magnesium and in some cases traces of platinum. This mineral is a concretion that occurs directly in the serpentine as do similar formations of iron (magnetite) and chrome. This, "nickel nugget," was first believed to be particles of a meteorite that had fallen in the valley. This is disproved by the fact that there are some times included particles of serpentine in the Josephinite. In a meteorite that could not be, because of the fact that the intense heat generated by its passage through the air would destroy anything but the metallic content of the particle.

The demand for nickel in the past few years has grown by leaps and bounds. The increase in the past year being 28 per cent. At present the supply for the trade is furnished by the international nickel corporation of Sudbury, Ontario, Canada. The process of refining is by smelting, casting the crude recovery into plates and electroplating out the pure nickel with the cathode electroplating process. The finished product has been marketed for the past nine years at 35 cents per pound.

A nickel deposit to be of commercial importance should be of the comparative size of a good commercial deposit of copper or iron, and it should have above 10 per cent of contained nickel in the ore.

The farmer has no such security. He depends on the ticker tape of the gambler, who uses only world prices as his top."

To meet this situation, Mahoney outlined a legislative program which would square with the democratic platform of 1932, and with President Roosevelt's assertion that fair prices should be available to farmers in years of plenty as

well as in years of failure. "The real friends of the farmer are fighting for this legislation today," he said, "but those who represent the gamblers in the wheat pit in Chicago have always been powerful enough to defeat this legislation."
