Bob Rout has arranged a signal from his garage, but it can only be heard for a short distance but will do until we can secure a siren that will tell all there is a fire. We also need 100 feet more of hose and 25 feet of suction hose to complete our equipment.

The department is practically broke, with only three dollars in the treasury. The hose and siren will cost fifty or seventy-five dollars, and this amount must be raised somehow, some place.
