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## Clean-Up Day Set For Friday

Clean-Up day for Cave Junction has been set for Friday, July 1st. We are sorry that the paper will not be in the hands of all by that time, but all will get the paper by noon Friday, and can help in the clean-up.

The Chamber has the cooperation of M. M. Nelson of the Forest Service and Sam Bunch of the highway department. Both men will do all in their power to help in the clean-up campaign.

It is planned to burn all the dry grass around the town and last Tuesday at the Chamber meeting, it was decided to start at 5 a. m. in the morning. Fire Chief George W. Martin has ordered the fire truck out at 5 a. m. to follow the fire burners of grass to wet down and take care of emergencies that may arise during the clean-up.

It is hoped by the Chamber that every resident of Cave Junction will participate in the clean-up and help lessen the fire hazard during the hot, dry summer.

## Forest Service Gives Rules for Fireworks

Recently several persons have called at the Redwood Ranger Station to inquire about federal and state laws in regard to burning and fireworks. It is felt that a brief statement of these rules may be of help.

1. Fireworks are NOT permitted on National forest land.

2. With regard to the Clean-up week: The Forest Service is pleased to see this move to clean up rubbish piles and trash and will do everything possible to help make the movement a success. However, it will be necessary to get a permit to burn before starting. The personnel at the Redwood Ranges Station will be glad to issue these permits and help you in any way. ## Jubilee Queen Contest Starts

President Roosevelt signed the moratorium bill and prospectors will not have to do their assessment work this year, according to the bill. However, only claim holders entitled to exemption from payment of income taxes for the 1937 tax year may claim the relief extended by the act, says the Grants Pass Courier.

Prospectors Claiming relief must file notice by midnight, July 1, of their desire to continue to hold their claims. This notice must be filed in the office where the location notice or certificate is recorded.

## Agricultural Committee of Grange to Meet

The seventh monthly meeting of the agricultural committees of the ten granges of Josephine county will be held in the courthouse on the evening of July 5.

J. L. Woodward, chairman of the Pomona agricultural committee is announcing that these monthly meetings will be thrown open to all farmers who are interested in promoting the agricultural development of their communities. These meetings have been well attended by grange members, and the Pomona committee believes that they also will be of interest to farmers in general and invites all those interested to attend.

Projects which have received attention by this committee have been weed control work, promotion of cooperation in the Federal Bug's testing, promotion of 4-H club work, assistance in rodent control work, maintaining an exchange list, and cooperative livestock marketing.

At these meetings also a general discussion on farming conditions over the state and nation takes place, using as a reference the material published by the bureau of Agricultural Economics.

## CAMP FIRE PERMITS REQUIRED AFTER 1ST

Camp fire permits will be required for building camp fires after July 1 in accordance with both federal regulations and state laws. Permits may be obtained at the Redwood Ranger station in Cave Junction, at the Store Gulch station on the Illinois river, Cedar Guard station on the Caves highway, at Elk Valley Guard station on the Redwood highway, or at any forest service lookout.

On the same date, July 1, other regulations become effective as follows:

1. No smoking while travelling will be permitted except while traveling two-way surfaced roads.

2. An axe, bucket, and shovel will be required for each party camping on the National Forest except parties which pack in on their backs.

3. Certain camp grounds are designated where no camp fire permits are required because they are equipped with stoves and are under the watchful eye of a forest guard. Those in the Illinois Valley are Grayback forest camp, Elk Valley forest camp, and Store Gulch forest camp.

## Chamber Plans Trip Happy Camp

Last Tuesday noon the Illinois Valley Chamber of Commerce met to discuss plans for the caravan of Chamber of Commerces from Grants Pass, Crescent City to join the Illinois Valley Chamber in one of the greatest caravans that ever visited Happy Camp.

The importance of the trip was outlined and when President Drews asked how many would attend, every hand went up, which means that there should be about 15 cars go from the valley on the visitation to our neighboring town in California.

President Drews said in opening the meeting that the receipts of the firemen's ball was \$15 and this amount was turned over to the firemen. The discussion then turned to the Happy Camp trip.

Much discussion was indulged in on how we were to go and how to advertise the fact that we were all from the Illinois Valley. Finally Elwood Hussey moved that a committee be appointed to take complete charge of the trip and make all arrangements. The committee consists of C. L. Schumacher, chairman; George L. Martin and Blake Miller. This committee will make all arrangements and the complete itinerary will be published in the issue of The News on July 7th issue. The caravan leaves Sunday morning, July 10th.

The importance of this trip cannot be too strongly impressed on the citizens of the valley. The principal issue is to get an all-year road between the Illinois Valley and Happy Camp so the people who live in Happy Camp can have an outlet that will be accessible all the year to the coast and interior points in Oregon.

When the road is completed it will be much easier for the residents of Happy Camp to take this road out than the present one to Yreka, and much shorter and a much better road when completed.

The road would throw much business to the merchants of this valley and to Grants Pass and Crescent City.

### What to Wear

Martin, suggest that the valley residents wear the official costume of the Miners' Jubilee and get as much publicity for the Jubilee as possible.
